U.S. vs. Ukraine

"Home, Sweet Home." How many times did you hear this phrase? Probably a billion times. And how about your homeland? Is it the same or different? How to decide if it is good or bad? Many people ask themselves these questions over and over again. I was asking them too, while I was moving from Ukraine to the US. Even though there are a few similarities, life in Ukraine and the United States are basically different.

Ukraine, as well as the U.S., has problems with traffic on the roads, especially in big cities. Well, too many cars is one of the biggest problems of any modern society. Nevertheless,

regarding parking problems, those two countries are pretty similar. Furthermore the lifestyle of people in Ukraine is getting more and more like the lifestyle in the States. Ukrainians are starting to spend more time working, which is really rare for post-Soviet Union countries. They are working harder, more, and with better quality. These facts and a few other small facts are

making Ukraine and the United States look like each other.

However, there are way more differences than similarities between these two countries. The biggest one is corruption in government. In Ukraine the corruption goes too far. For example, if someone kills somebody, he can pay the judge to make his punishment much easier or even escape from prison. Corruption also adds problems to running small and medium businesses since for every official paper you need to pay double price - the official tax and some extra money to the guy who gives those papers. One of my friends decided not to pay the extra for receiving his passport in Kiev. As a result, he received it in four months, while another of my friends, who paid "the tip", got his in four days. And that's for a document that everyone must have. You can imagine what the expenses for opening and running your own business in a country like Ukraine are. The next huge difference

is the health care system. Even though in Ukraine medicine is free, unlike in the United States, "no extra charge" exists only on paper. To get good and proper health care you need to spend almost the same amount of money you will spend in the U.S. Of course, nowadays some insurance companies can provide a partial coverage of your expenses but still the level of service the Ukrainian system provides is way lower than what the American system provides. Another big difference is the people's mentality and their life values. Growing up in a socialistic and atheistic society pays off. In some ways, Ukrainians act almost inappropriately for Americans. Take, for example, cheating in class. Well, we all

cheat at least once or maybe a few times in high school, but let's talk about college. Most Americans just don't understand cheating since they study for education, not for a degree. At the same time, many Ukrainians are basically proud to share how they cheat or get a better grade with no studying. This is the way they were raised – get to the goal no matter what. Some Ukrainians are

what. Some Ukrainians are even using this thesis while they run a business or communicate with their neighbors. I know one guy who sells salvage cars as new to other Ukrainians who have just come to the States and are not able to check the car. This is really rude and impolite. For sure not all Ukrainians act the same way; however, the mentality of people in those countries is very different.

In conclusion, even though Ukraine and the United States have a few similarities, a huge amount of big differences like people's mentalities, problems with government, and health care puts a high barrier to communication and understanding between them. So, if you choose one or the other countries to live in, remember you might need to adjust!

History of the Income Tax in the United States

The nation had few taxes in its early history. From 1791 to 1802, the United States government was supported by internal taxes on distilled spirits, carriages, refined sugar, tobacco and snuff, property sold at auction, corporate bonds, and slaves. The high cost of the War of 1812 brought about the nation's first sales taxes on gold, silverware, jewelry, and watches. In 1817, however, Congress did away with all internal taxes, relying on tariffs on imported goods to provide sufficient funds for running the government.

In 1862, in order to support the Civil War effort, Congress enacted the nation's first income tax law. It was a forerunner of our modern income tax in that it was based on the principles of graduated, or progressive, taxation and of withholding income at the source. During the Civil War, a person earning from \$600 to \$10,000 per year paid tax at the rate of 3%. Those with incomes of more than \$10,000 paid taxes at a higher rate. Additional sales and excise taxes were added, and an "inheritance" tax also made its debut. In 1866, internal revenue collections reached their highest point in the nation's 90-year history—more than \$310 million, an amount not reached again until 1911.

The Act of 1862 established the office of Commissioner of Internal Revenue. The Commissioner was given the power to assess, levy, and collect taxes, and the right to enforce the tax laws through seizure of property and income and through prosecution. The powers and authority remain very much the same today.

In 1868, Congress again focused its taxation efforts on tobacco and distilled spirits and eliminated the income tax in 1872. It had a short-lived revival in 1894 and 1895. In the latter year, the U.S. Supreme Court decided that the income tax was unconstitutional because it was not apportioned among the states in conformity with the Constitution.

In 1913, the 16th Amendment to the Constitution made the income tax a permanent fixture in the U.S. tax system. The amendment gave Congress legal authority to tax income and resulted in a revenue law that taxed incomes of both individuals and corporations. In fiscal year 1918, annual internal revenue collections for the first time passed the billion-dollar mark, rising to \$5.4 billion by 1920. With the advent of World War II, employment increased, as did tax collections—to \$7.3 billion. The withholding tax on wages was introduced in 1943 and was instrumental in increasing the number of taxpayers to 60 million and tax collections to \$43 billion by 1945.

In 1981, Congress enacted the largest tax cut in U.S. history, approximately \$750 billion over six years. The tax reduction, however, was partially offset by two tax acts, in 1982 and 1984, that attempted to raise approximately \$265 billion.

On Oct. 22, 1986, President Reagan signed into law the Tax Re-

form Act of 1986, one of the most far-reaching reforms of the United States tax system since the adoption of the income tax. The top tax rate on individual income was lowered from 50% to 28%, the lowest it had been since 1916. Tax preferences were eliminated to make up most of the revenue. In an attempt to remain revenue neutral, the act called for a \$120 billion increase in business taxation and a corresponding decrease in individual taxation over a five-year period.

Following what seemed to be a yearly tradition of new tax acts that began in 1986, the Revenue Reconciliation Act of 1990 was signed into law on Nov. 5, 1990. As with the '87, '88, and '89 acts, the 1990 act, while providing a number of substantive provisions, was small in comparison with the 1986 act. The emphasis of the 1990 act was increased taxes on the wealthy.

On Aug. 10, 1993, President Clinton signed the Revenue Reconciliation Act of 1993 into law. The act's purpose was to reduce by approximately \$496 billion the federal deficit that would otherwise accumulate in fiscal years 1994 through 1998. In 1997, Clinton signed another tax act. The act, which cut taxes by \$152 billion, included a cut in capital-gains tax for individuals, a \$500 per child tax credit, and tax incentives for

President George W. Bush signed a series of tax cuts into law. The largest was the Economic Growth and Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2001. It was estimated to save taxpayers \$1.3 trillion over ten years, making it the third largest tax cut since World War II. The Bush tax cut created a new lowest rate, 10% for the first several thousand dollars earned. It also established a slow schedule of incremental tax cuts that would eventually double the child tax credit from \$500 to \$1,000, adjust brackets so that middle-income couples owed the same tax as comparable singles, cut the top four tax rates (28% to 25%; 31% to 28%; 36% to 33%; and 39.6% to 35%).

The Jobs and Growth Tax Relief and Reconciliation Act of 2003 accelerated the tax rate cuts that had been enacted in 2001, and temporarily reduced the tax rate on capital gains and dividends to 15%. In 2004, the U.S. was forced to eliminate a corporate tax provision that had been ruled illegal by the World Trade Organization. Along with that tax hike, Congress passed a cornucopia of tax breaks, which for individuals included an option to deduct the payment of whichever state taxes were higher, sales or income taxes.

Two tax bills signed in 2005 and 2006 extended through 2010 the favorable rates on capital gains and dividends that had been enacted in 2003, raised the exemption levels for the Alternative Minimum Tax, and enacted new tax incentives designed to persuade individuals to save more for retirement.





Toyota Gives ARC a Break

Fed Health Care Issue Divides Nation





Dear Omar,



Joseph Pulitzer: A Real Prize

In the latter years of the 19th century, Joseph Pulitzer stood out as the very embodiment of American journalism. Hungarian-born, an intense indomitable figure, Pulitzer was the most skillful of newspaper publishers, a passionate crusader against dishonest government, a fierce, hawk-like competitor who did not shrink from sensationalism in circulation struggles, and a visionary who richly endowed his profession.



His innovative New York World and St. Louis Post-Dispatch reshaped newspaper journalism. Pulitzer was the first to call for the training of journalists at the university level in a school of journalism. And certainly, the lasting influence of the Pulitzer Prizes on journalism, literature, music, and drama is to be attributed to his visionary acumen.

Parenting the Parrot Way!

Simple Science Projects



Prof. Moon's kids

Here are some activities related to wind, land, and water that will challenge your child's thinking skills.

Wind

In which direction will an object move?

When children blow on a tissue, a ping-pong ball or another light object, they will discover that they are unable to blow anything toward themselves; things move in the direction of the wind.

From which direction does the wind come? Wet a finger and hold it in the air. Children will determine the wind's direction from the fact that the wind comes from the direction of the side of the finger which dries faster and feels colder.

What else can you do in your everyday observations to find out what else the wind does? You see that it holds things up--kites, planes, birds, and it can blow things away--paper, clothes, leaves. Distance, height, and speed can be explored by tying your old greeting cards to a string on the clothesline. The wind will be seen to move small, large, long, or wide cards differently.

Land

How far can objects move from their base? Ask your child to put some marbles beneath a coffee can cover. When you give it a shove, how far can it travel? Will the speed and distance be altered when some marbles are removed?

Try a different type of object--a barrel shape such as an empty orange juice can. This time punch holes in each end and thread strong elastic through the holes. Hang a large wooden bead or comparable object in the center of the elastic to serve as a weight. Now you are ready to experiment with movement and direction.

Will the can roll forward and backward? Why does it return? Will it roll faster than a can without a weight? How far will a weighted barrel travel each way?

Water

How will objects glide through water? Which ones will move the easiest and the fastest?

To explore speed, direction and movement in water, assemble a variety of flotations--air-filled plastic bottles, coffee cans, wood cubes, corks, and foam.

Mim's Cafe

Julie Caspersen, an ESL professor at ARC, submitted the recipe below. One day she brought this raw carrot cake roll to share with the staff at the Learning Resource Center. After tasting it, we begged her for the recipe. According to The Complete Book of Raw Food, raw food or living food "is plant or animal food that has not been hearted above 115 Fahrenheit" (p. 1). Most people who are on raw food diet believe that when food is heated above 115 degrees "the enzymes in the food are destroyed or denatured, or cannot provide the same nutritive value" (p.1). Many raw food chefs believe that raw food is the best kind of diet for those who wish to shed extra pounds or adopt a healthier eating habit. I am accustomed to eating raw food because in Cambodia (where I

was born) there is an abundance of fruits, edible, leafy green plants, and assorted nuts that are eaten with special dips. However I have never tried mixing different raw foods together. I'll have to experiment. It's hard to describe what raw food tastes like because each piece of fruit or vegetable you pick never tastes the same. That's what makes raw food so exciting. I hope you try this recipe.

Carrot Cake Roll

Ingredients

2 cups oat flour (made by processing rolled oats in a blender or food processor)

2 cups pulp from 6-8 large juiced carrots (or add carrot juice to get a "doughy" texture)

¼ teaspoon sea salt

2 cups dates, finely chopped or ground

1 cup walnuts chopped

½ cup raisins (optional: soak overnight to make them softer)

2 teaspoons vanilla

3 Tablespoons agave honey or raw honey

Directions

Mix all ingredients together well. Knead and form into 2 rolls for slicing or layers for a layer cake.

"Impresssionism." From the Counselor's Corner

Can a Counselor tell me what major or career is good for me?

a. A major is what a person is very interested in studying and a career is something you will be doing for a long time, not a temporary job that you do for a month or two. In some countries, children study the same subjects and work at the same jobs their parents or grand-parents used to do. In America, in some areas or professions, people still do what

their parents and grand-parents do; but it is more common nowadays for children to work in something completely different than what their parents do. Sometimes they may even have to move away far from their family. They may move to another town or even another state because their job requires them to.

b. There are many factors one must consider in making a decision about a career. A counselor can show you how to look for infor-

mation that is helpful for you to make that decision, but a counselor cannot tell you what is "good" for you. Things about your interest, your ability, your family, and your commitments are things that only you know. The job market also changes, sometimes only because of one single event, in your town, your state, in the USA or some where in the world. It is something neither you nor the counselor has control over or advance knowledge about.


c. ARC offers classes that help you make your decision by helping you find out about yourself, and showing you where to find information about certain careers to best match your interest, ability, and personality. One of these classes is Hu-

man Career Development 330 (or HCD 330 as listed in the class schedule). You can certainly discuss it with a counselor; together you can decide the best activity for you in order to search for a compatible major/career.

I already had a career in my country; why can't I take the same one?

Depending on what you did, sometimes you can do the same thing that you used to do, sometimes you just need to update your information or skills appropriate to the market

here in the United States. Some professions have a licensing requirement, and you have to take the test or whatever so you can work here. It's different for each state, so sometimes people (American citizens) who move from one state to another have to take the test to qualify for the new state also.



The first thing you need to do is to have your official (it means in a sealed envelope, not opened) evaluated by one of the agencies that is a member of NACES (National Association of Credential Services). Here is their website: http://www.naces.org/. The service is pretty expensive, and some of the classes may not be acceptable if taken outside of the United States, such as English. You should talk it over with a counselor before requesting this service.


