Deaf Culture: What Teachers Need To Hear

Have you ever met a Deaf person? There are two differences between "Deaf" and "deaf". The word "Deaf" with a capital letter is people who identify themselves with Deaf culture and have a strong Deaf identity. They use American Sign Language to communicate with Deaf people. The word "deaf" with small lowercase letters are people who live in the 'hearing' world and wear hearing aids and who identify with having hearing loss. I am a Deaf person. I have dreams and goals to go to college and become a professor for Deaf studies. I went to mainstream school grow-

ing up and now I go to a mainstream college. I want teachers to know more about Deaf people who are in their classes in a mainstream public school. There is some really good information teachers should know about Deaf

people, who they are as individuals and

who they are as a culture.

The first piece of information teachers should know about Deaf people is that they are very good visually. Teachers need to realize that most Deaf students tend to learn better visually. We have 180 degree peripherals that can see everything and it is easy to notice something very quickly. For example, once while in class, I sat down while looking as an interpreter translated

while the teacher lectured about history.

Then the teacher handed out the papers that we needed to work on to students. After we completed the worksheet, I chatted for a while with a friend that sits right next to me. When the teacher tried to get our attention, especially from my friend, I couldn't hear what the teacher was saying and the interpreters got our attention by using their hands to wave at us. We quickly looked at them because our eyes are very sensitive and quick to make eye contact with people who try to get our attention.

The second bit of information teachers should

know about Deaf people is the relationship between the Deaf and interpreters. Teachers should check with the students to make sure they are up to date with the concepts since there can be accidental miscommunication between students and interpreters. It often happens to everyone that there are a few misunderstandings in com-

munication. It does get frustrating for Deaf

tion and it makes them feel they are very behind. For example, one of my friends had a class with an interpreter, and this interpreter wasn't very clear what she should be translating when the teacher was presenting in class. My friend Katy wasn't able to understand what the interpreter was interpreting and not getting the concept of what she needed to know or what the teacher was talking about.

That's because Katy was very behind and she didn't want to interrupt the teacher while she was trying to teach the students. Katy had to ask the

teacher after the class and the teacher told her that reading the book would probably help her to understand. She didn't like the teacher's idea

because she would rather listen to the teacher's lecture to get to know what would give her some concept to understand or what the book was talking about. So Katy made the decision to drop the class right after midterm because she was missing a lot of information while in class and her grade was dropping. In addition, she didn't want to get a bad grade that would affect her GPA on her transcript. She wishes she had had a better interpreter to make sure the concepts were correctly translated.

Deaf people is to treat the Deaf equal as oth-

er humans. Teachers should treat Deaf

equally and not assume that they are not capable of understanding con-

cepts. They are capable of learning,

but mostly in a different way. For example, I have seen many times that

the teacher will approach a Deaf student and ask if they're sure they want to take this

class because it can be very challenging. However, they do not have the same approach with

the hearing students in that same class. We are all students learning a new language and it will

be a challenge for everyone to learn, but not just Deaf people will have trouble. It's not right to just assume Deaf people will have problems. It's dis-

respectful and can hurt their feelings. There are different ways to teach different styles of learning.

The third thing teachers should know about Deaf people prefer visual learning and if we do not fully understand all lectures, maybe it's

because it's not a visual lecture.

In conclusion, these are very important ideas that Deaf people wish teachers knew about them. Deaf people want to have normal lives. They don't want people to pity them

or look down on them or think they live such a difficult life being Deaf because that's not true. They want to have

a life just like every other human has because Deaf people can do anything hearing people can do; they just do it without hearing.

<u>Laundry Was Scoured in Lye Made of Ashes</u> and Urine



Ancient Romans believed in the ability of urine to remove stains. Until the medieval times, people used lye made of ashes and urine in order to clean their clothes.

Privies and Garderobe

In Tudor houses, toilets were a bowl with a slab of wood and a hole carved at the top. Builders set the toilet into a recess or cupboard-like area called a garderobe. In castles, a slab of



wood covers a hole in the floor that took waste products straight into the moat. Poor people didn't have the luxury of toilets, so they simply relieved themselves wherever they could and just buried the waste matter.

No Changing of Clothes

King James VI of Scotland wore the same clothes for months on end, even sleeping on them in occasion. He also kept the same hat on 24 hours a day until it fell apart. He didn't take a bath as he thought it was bad for his health.

Lice Infested Wigs

Nits and lice were common back then, so many of the more wealthy folks would shave their natural hair and wear periwigs instead. Unfortunately, even periwigs could be infested with nits, especially

during plagues.

Mousey Eyebrows

People were already fashion-conscious during the medieval times. When their eyebrows did not look fashionable, they often masked them with tiny piec-

es of skin from a mouse.



Since the sewage system back then was not yet proper, people had to make do with bury-

ing much of their waste material in a cesspit in their cellar or garden. People should have emptied these cesspits regularly, but only a few of them did. The stench was overwhelming especially during summer and winter.

Infection from Rushes

One of the biggest sources of infection during the medieval times was the use

of rushes or straws to cover up the natural dirt floor of a building. Although people often changed the top rushes, they did not do the same to the bottom layer, hence leading to all manner of possible infection sources.

A Peculiar Cure to Baldness

A 17th century publication by Peter Levens instructed men on how to cure thinning hair and pattern baldness. Men had to combine potassium salts with chicken droppings, and then place the mixture on the affected area. If they wanted to remove unwanted hair from any area of the body, they had to make a paste consisting of eggs, strong vinegar, and cat dung, and then apply it to the area where they want to remove hair.

Lead-Lined Water Tanks

Even though the rich paid for private water companies for their drinking and other water needs, the water that they consumed was not

exactly better than those of peasants. The main water supply came from elm trunks and domestic pipes lined with lead. Water also required storage in large lead tanks and often became stagnant.

<u>Bird Droppings on the</u> <u>Bed</u>

Houses in the past didn't have the protective roofing that houses have today, so it wasn't unusual for bugs,



pests, and droppings to fall onto the clean bedding. People then invented four-poster beds in order to keep a canopy that would catch all unpleasant stuff falling from the roof and not soil the bedding.

The History of a Movement

Each year, Earth Day -- April 22 -- marks the anniversary of what many consider the birth of the modern environmental movement in 1970.

The height of hippie and flower-child culture in the United States, 1970 brought the death of Jimi Hendrix, the last Beatles album, and Simon & Garfunkel's "Bridge Over Troubled Water". Protest

was the order of the day, but saving the planet was not the cause. War raged in Vietnam, and students nationwide increasingly opposed it.

At the time, Americans were slurping leaded gas through massive V8 sedans. Industry belched out smoke and sludge with little fear of legal consequences or bad press. Air pollution was commonly accepted as the smell of prosperity. "Environment" was a word that appeared more often in spelling bees than on the evening news. Although main-

stream America remained oblivious to environmental concerns, the stage had been set for change by the publication of Rachel Carson's New York Times bestseller Silent Spring in 1962. The book represented a watershed moment for the modern environmental movement, selling more than 500,000 copies in 24 countries and, up until that moment, more than any other person, Ms. Carson raised public awareness and concern for

living organisms, the environment and public health.

Earth Day 1970 capitalized on the emerging consciousness, channeling the energy of the anti-war protest movement and put-

ting environmental concerns front and center.

The Idea

The idea came to Earth Day founder Gaylord Nelson, then a U.S. Senator from Wisconsin, after witnessing the ravages of the 1969 massive oil spill in Santa Barbara, California. Inspired by the student anti-war movement, he realized that if he could in -fuse that energy with an emerging public consciousness about air and water pol-

lution, it would force environmental protection onto the national political agenda. Senator

Nelson announced the idea

for a "national teach-in on the environment" to the national media; persuaded Pete McCloskey, a conservation-minded Republican Congressman, to serve as his co-chair; and recruited Denis Hayes as na-

tional coordinator. Hayes built a national staff of 85 to promote events across the land.

As a result, on the 22nd of April, 20 million Americans took to the streets, parks, and auditoriums to demonstrate for a healthy, sustainable environment in massive coast-to-coast rallies. Thousands of colleges and universities organized protests against the deterioration of the environment. Groups that had been fighting against oil spills, polluting factories and power plants, raw sewage, toxic dumps, pesticides, freeways, the loss of wilderness, and the extinction of wildlife suddenly realized they shared common values.

Earth Day 1970 achieved a rare political alignment,

enlisting support from Republicans and Democrats, rich and poor, city slickers and farmers, tycoons and labor leaders. The first Earth Day led to the creation of the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the passage of the Clean Air, Clean Water, and Endangered Species Acts. "It was a gamble," Gaylord recalled, "but it worked."

As 1990 approached, a group of environmental leaders asked Denis Hayes to organize another big campaign. This time, Earth Day went global, mobilizing 200 million people in 141 countries and lifting en-

vironmental issues onto the world stage. Earth Day 1990 gave a huge boost to recycling efforts worldwide and helped pave the way for the 1992 United Nations Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro. It also prompted President Bill Clinton to award Senator Nelson the Presidential Medal of Freedom (1995) -- the highest honor

given to civilians in the United States -- for his role as Earth Day founder.



"Frequently Asked Questions"

• When is Earth Day?

Earth Day is honored around the world on April 22, although larger events such as festivals and rallies are often organized for the weekends before or after April 22. Many communities also observe Earth Week or Earth Month, organizing a series of environmental activities throughout the month of April.

• Why do we need an Earth Day?

Because it works! Earth Day broadens the base of support for environmental programs, rekindles public commitment and builds community activism around the world through a broad range of events and activities. Earth Day is the largest civic event in the world, celebrated simultaneously around the globe by people of all backgrounds, faiths and nationalities. More than a billion people participate in our campaigns every year.

What can I do for Earth Day?

The possibilities for getting involved are endless! Volunteer. Go to a festival. Install solar panels on your roof. Organize an event in your community. Change a habit. Help launch a community garden.

Communicate vour priorities to your elected representatives. Do something nice for the Earth. have fun, meet new people, and make a difference. But you needn't wait for April 22! Earth Day is Every Day. To build a better future, we all must commit to protect our environment year-round.

Founded by the organizers of the first Earth Day in 1970, Earth Day Network (EDN) promotes year-round environmental citizenship and action, worldwide. Earth Day Network is a driving force, steering environmental awareness around the world. Punctuation The Colon and the Semicolon

The Colon

 The colon expands on the sentence that precedes it, often introducing a list that demonstrates or elaborates whatever was previously stated.

EXAMPLES:

- There are many reasons for poor written communication: lack of planning, poor grammar, misuse of punctuation marks, and insufficient vocabulary.
- He collected a strange assortment of items: bird's eggs, stamps, bottle tops, string, and buttons.
- Peter had an eclectic taste in music: latin, jazz, country and western, pop, blues, and classical.
- He had just one fault: an enormous ego.
- 2. The colon is also used to divide the hour from the minutes in writing a time in English.

EXAMPLES:

- 4:15 = "four fifteen"
- 6:45 = "six fourty-five"

The Semicolon

The semicolon is somewhere between a full stop and a comma. Semicolons can be used in English to join phrases and sentences that are thematically linked without having to use a conjunction (example 1 below). Semicolons can also be used instead of commas to separate the items in a list when the items themselves already contain commas (example 2 below).

EXAMPLES:

- I like your brother; he's a good friend.
- Many great leaders, Churchill, leader of Britain during the Second World War; Alexander, the great Roman Emperor and general; and Napolean, the brilliant French general, had strong characters, which were useful when their countries were at war but which did not serve them well in times of peace.







Firefighters Help Free Two Little Bear Cubs Trapped Inside a Tree

stuck, she decided to come back and check the next day — and the following morning the snout was still there.

She called authorities out to help and two wardens from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources were dispatched to the tree where they discovered that it contained a pair of bear cubs who appear to have crawled into the hole, but were unable to crawl out.

"In 15 years of being a warden I haven't seen a bears caught in a tree before. I've seen lots of bears just none that were trapped like that," says warden Jesse Ashton to news station KARE 11.

Unequipped to get the cubs out themselves, the wardens asked for the local fire department's help. Using a chainsaw, firefighters carefully cut two wider openings into the hollow tree's base, while one of the little bears watched on from his hole.

"We cut a hole in the tree and then we all backed off and waited," warden Phil Dorn said. "The cubs crawled out and ran back into the woods."

A wildlife specialist who was on hand determined that aside from being dehydrated, the bears were in good condition. She offered them some watermelon to eat before letting them scamper back off into the woods. A representative from the Department of Natural Resources told The Dodo that the bears' mother was likely still somewhere nearby.

Carol: My goal is student success.
