The last but not least important effect of the computer on our family life is the effect it has on our communication skills. Thanks to computers,


our ability to communicate

Solutions to Immigrant Culture Loss

There are always gaps between generations, between parents and children. What about the immigrants? The gaps are even bigger because children are different, completely different. They are adopting a new culture, language, traditions, and values. We cannot avoid gaps; however, we can make them less visible. There are several solutions to the problem of children forgetting and rejecting their native roots, language, culture, and traditions:

for them to speak their native language at home, for parents and children to spend time together, and for parents to try harder to understand their children.

The first solution to the problem of children forgetting or rejecting their roots is for the family to speak

In addition, it is very important for parents to send their child to, for example, a school where a child can learn how to read and write in the mother language. The second solution to help shrink gaps between parents and their children is for the family to spend time together. Many parents work all the time and rarely see their children. Those children basically grow up by themselves. When they become adults, they

My mom's friend spent a lot of time telling her child how it was back there, the lifestyle, hardships, and, more importantly, she taught her the language and how to read and write. That daughter is 18 right now and she isn't ashamed to say that she is second-generation Ukrainian. Parents need to spend more time with their children; they should try to involve children in their basic work like cooking and cleaning. Parents need to go to the park with kids. Parents need to ask their kids

how their day was, and read them a story before bed. Those simple things will help every parent to be closer to his/ her child.

The third solution to the problem of children rejecting their parents' traditions is for parents to understand their children. What I mean is that children are not the only ones who should give up something. Parents should too. Maybe some compromise will help. Parents should not force their children but with love explain to them why it's important not to forget their native language, culture, and traditions. They should be friends, not enemies. enough to possess an important record. It came by chance into my hands, and I still keep it with me. This important and valuable document is a manuscript revealing the origin of my family.


It all started when I visited my cousin Mahfoud, who lived in my city, Medea, in Algeria. He is an educated man and works in a government office


opposite wall. The tomb of Haj Ali was totally covered with a decorated wooden box. It was painted in blue, white, green, and red. A small chandelier

the dark web, acting as an administrator for Dream Market, a marketplace for illegal narcotics including cocaine, heroin and methamphetamines, counterfeit consumer goods and stolen data.

Vallerius was arrested as he landed at Atlanta international airport on 31 August, and during a border search of his laptop confirmed his identity as "OxyMonster", the username for a Dream Market account that was not only listed as an administrator for the site but also listed prescription drugs including OxyContin and Ritalin for sale. Officials also discovered about \$500,000 in bitcoins, the currency used for anonymously trading on the marketplace.

The arrest, first reported by the Miami Herald, was the culmination a multi-agency investigation that started in February 2016. As part of the investigation, Drug Enforcement Administration agents made undercover purchases of crystal meth, LSD and hydrocodone from a range of vendors on Dream Market and trawled the site to identify the usernames associated with the organising team.

"OxyMonster knowingly participated in the Dream Market conspiracy not only as a vendor, but also in a leadership and organizational role as a senior moderator and administrator," court documents state.

Investigators tied the username to Vallerius's real identity through his bitcoin transactions, some of which went to bitcoin wallets associated with his name. They then tracked down his Instagram and Twitter accounts to compare the writing style with that of OxyMonster and discovered "many similarities" including the use of the word "cheers", frequent quotation marks and intermittent French posts, according to court documents filed in Florida.

His trip to the beard contest was Vallerius's first time in the United States. He had registered for the "full beard 30.1-45cm" category, one of 27 at this year's event.

Bryan Nelson, the co-founder of the Austin Facial Hair Club, which hosted this year's championships, described the arrest as "pretty dramatic". This year's event had 738 competitors from 33 countries and, apart from Vallerius, the only contestants who weren't able to attend were people from Nepal and the Middle East who had trouble getting their visas.

Although Nelson had never met Vallerius in person, he immediately recognized him when he learned of the arrest from his involvement in an app called "Beard Wars".

Players of Beard Wars would bet chips on their own beard versus someone else's beard and other people would vote for the best one. The person with the most votes would win the chips.

Nelson and his friend MJ Johnson would consistently rank No 1 and No 2 within the app, until a user called "Barba" came out of nowhere and started amassing loads of chips.

"You could see false accounts were getting created to make bets," said Johnson, one of the winners at this year's World Beard and Moustache Championships.

Within weeks, Barba had more chips than Johnson and Nelson put together.

Nelson and Johnson felt vindicated in the Beard Wars this week when they saw Vallerius's photo in the news. It turns out that "Barba" was actually Gal Vallerius.

"As soon as I saw the story and saw he was a computer guy it all made sense," said Johnson.

Johnson, who also met Vallerius at the 2015 championships in Austria, said that he "always seemed like a fun, carefree person".

Regardless of his alleged crimes, both Nelson and Johnson are impressed by Vallerius's facial hair.

"I don't know anything about what other stuff he did, but as far as his beard goes, it's really awesome, long and bright red," said Johnson.

Vallerius's arrest is the latest episode in a broader crackdown on dark web marketplaces by the US government, which previously infiltrated and shut down AlphaBay and Hansa.

Following the closure of AlphaBay and Hansa, many traders had flocked to Dream Market to continue their operations.

At a court hearing in Atlanta, Vallerius did not contest his identity and detention. He is expected to be transferred to Miami, where the complaint was filed, where he faces another conspiracy indictment that carries up to a life sentence.

Kazakhstan to Qazaqstan: Why would a country switch its alphabet?



The Kazakh language has long been unsure which alphabet to find a comfortable home in and it's now in for another transition - but this is not without controversy.

Last Friday Kazakh President Nursultan Nazarbayev finally decreed that the language would shed its heavy Cyrillic coat and don what he hopes to be a more fashionable attire: the Latin alphabet.

Is this going to be easy?

No. The Latin alphabet has far fewer letters: There will need to be creative combinations with apostrophes to catch all the sounds needed for the Kazakh

language.

Kazakhstan is in an unusual position: None of the alphabets that exist seem like a perfect fit or have a long enough tradition to be the uncontested host for its language.

Kazakh is a Turk-based language and its history is political: Originally it was written in Arabic. Enter the Soviet Union who in 1929 did away with Arabic and introduced Latin - only to 11 years later shift to the Cyrillic alphabet to have the republic more in line with the rest of the USSR.

The Kazakh version of Cyrillic has 33 Russian letters and nine Kazakh ones, while the Latin script only has 26.

The big changeover is to be official by 2025.

Confused by all this talk about letters and characters? Before you get lost in translation, here are a few spellings of the country's name just to give you an idea:

Russian Cyrillic Kazakh Cyrillic current Latin future Latin?

Ka3axctah Ka3axctah Kazakhstan Qazaqstan



Why change?

President Nursultan Nazarbayev has given a lengthy explanation: There are many reasons like of modernising Kazakhstan, but also determined by "specific political reasons".

Political pundits see it as step to weaken the historical ties to Russia: Shedding not only the Russian alphabet, the thinking goes, but also the influence Moscow still likes to exert over its post-Soviet backyard in central Asia.

There are also more immediate practical reasons: The hope is that Latin letters will make it easier



to push for modernisation in a global and digital world.

Of the other four Former Soviet Republics in Central Asia, Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan still use Cyrillic while Uzbekistan and Turkmenistan are using the Latin alphabet.

Will it be a smooth transition?

This discussion is not new: The change to the Latin alphabet has been mooted several times since the country's independence after the end of the Soviet Union, but so far has failed to garner widespread support.

Because: If even the name of the country would change from Kazakhstan to Qazaqstan, just imagine the potential for confusion in people's daily lives?

Let's look at the innocent carrot for an example: The Kazakh word for carrot is "cəбi3" and would traditionally be spelled "sabeez" in Latin. In new Latin

alphabet though, it will end up as "sa'biz".



This, again, is awfully close to the Latin spelling of an extremely rude Russian swear word.

Not all the mix-ups are as delicate as this one: But there's ample discussion online of people confused and amused by how they now should write their own names and whether the change will work out well not.

While some see it as a right step out of the shadows of the Soviet past and of present Russian influence, others warn it's a politically motivated move which will disconnect future generations from the country's written past century.

So what is next?

By the end of the year there will a finalised official Latin spelling. By next year teacher training is to begin and new textbooks will be developed.

Come 2025, all official paperwork and publications in the Kazakh language will be in the new Latin script. President Nazarbayev indicated though there would be a transition period where Cyrillic might still be used as well.

Given that Russian is the country's second official language, signs and official documents will though remain bilingual: in the Kazakh with Latin letters and in Russian with the Cyrillic alphabet.



Corned Beef Hash



Total:45 min

Prep: 15 min

Cook: 30 min

Yield: Serves 4



Ingredients

2 tablespoons vegetable oil

8 ounces cooked corned beef, diced

1 white onion, finely chopped

1 bell pepper, finely chopped

2 medium baking potatoes, peeled and shredded (about 2 cups)

4 tablespoons unsalted butter

4 large eggs

Kosher salt and freshly ground pepper

4 slices cheddar cheese (about 2 ounces)

Directions

Heat the oil in a medium skillet over high heat. Add the corned beef and cook, stirring with a wooden spoon, until it releases some fat and browns slightly, about 3 minutes. Stir in the onion, bell pepper and potatoes and cook, undisturbed, until brown and crisp on the bottom, about 6 minutes. Continue cooking, turning the hash as it browns evenly, about 15 more minutes.

Meanwhile, heat the butter in a nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Fry the eggs sunnyside up or over easy; season with salt and pepper.

Place the cheese slices on top of the hash, reduce the heat and let sit until the cheese melts, about 1 minute. To serve, top each portion of hash with a fried egg.

GrammarParentheses

Rule 1. Use parentheses to enclose information that clarifies or is used as an aside.

<u>Example</u>: He finally answered (after taking five minutes to think) that he did not understand the question.

Rule 2.

If material in parentheses ends a sentence, the period goes after the parentheses.

Example: He gave me a nice bonus (\$500).

Rule 2a. Periods go inside parentheses only if an entire sentence is inside the parentheses.

Example: Please read the analysis. (You'll be amazed.)

Rule 2b. Take care to punctuate correctly when punctuation is required both inside and outside parentheses. Example: You are late (aren't you?).

Note the question mark within the parentheses. The period after the parentheses is necessary to bring the entire sentence to a close.

Rule 3. Parentheses, despite appearances, are not part of the subject.

<u>Example</u>: Joe (and his trusty mutt) was always welcome.

Rule 4. Commas are more likely to follow parentheses than precede them.

<u>Incorrect</u>: When he got home, (it was already dark outside) he fixed dinner.

<u>Correct</u>: When he got home (it was already dark outside), he fixed dinner.

*Exceptions of this rule are words ending ind, ild, old, olt and ost.


*Open syllable - can only have one vowel sound which is the last letter in the syllable. The vowel sound is long.



Interview with Professor Wood Continued from page 1

The Parrot: Do you have any advice to aspiring artists on how to find their personal style?

Prof. Wood: I would advise aspiring artists and students not to worry too much about personal style. The best thing is to be open to trying lots of different media, approaches, and styles. In order to grow as an artist one has to remain open to different ideas and ways of doing things.

The Parrot: What advice would you give aspiring artists when it comes to self-promotion?

Prof. Wood: If an emerging artist wants to start exhibiting their work or is attempting to get their

work some recognition, the most important thing to do is to network. They should go to as many events/exhibitions as possible and meet as many people as possible in their local art community. That's the key more than anything else. It still has to be face-to-face. You can do some with social media but you really need to get out there and meet people.

The Parrot: What inspires you?

Prof. Wood: I am often inspired by my students. Watching them create and try new media and approaches for the first time is always exciting.

The Parrot: What motivates you?

Prof. Wood: I think I am mostly motivated by my ideas. My mind is always conjuring up ideas and I

begin to feel overloaded if I don't get them down on paper. I feel that it is necessary for me to process one idea before I can move on to others.

The Parrot: What role does the artist have in society?

Prof. Wood: I believe that artists make people see and consider things from a different point of view. Sometimes this simply means that an artist uses a material in a different or new way, or uses materials that are not consider traditional. Sometimes art is intended to provoke politically or is just simply to get people to pay attention to things they may be ignoring.

The Parrot: Name three artist you would like to be compared to?

Prof. Wood: I don't think it is necessary to be compared to anyone. In-fact, comparisons can sometimes pigeonhole an artist and create expectations in regards to their work. This can end up feeling like a trap.

The Parrot: What do you dislike about the art world?

Prof. Wood: I dislike the aspects of the art world that feel too money-driven. Of course money is a part of it but there are some art dealers and organizations that seem like they are just in it for the money.

The Parrot: What other forms of art do you like beside sculpture?

Prof. Wood: I am not a sculptor; I am a painter but I mostly draw and work with watercolors now. I do, however, love sculpture and photography. While I have completed a few decent sculptures in the past, I have never been very successful at photography. I don't think I am a patient enough person for the process. However, my art collection includes many beautiful photos create by people other than myself.

The Parrot: What obstacles do you face in making and exhibiting your work?

Prof. Wood: I think many artists, myself included, face the obstacle of not having enough time.

Every artist I know would like to have more time to create. When it comes to creating, there never seems to be enough time.






