Types of Wedding Gifts in Russia

A wedding is an unforgettable day for almost all couples. Even if a bride and a groom don't celebrate this day, most of them get gifts from relatives and friends. Flowers and postcards are an integral part of any wedding gift in Russia. Regarding other gifts, folk wisdom says, "Don't look a gift horse in the mouth," but, honestly, some gifts are accepted with great pleasure, and some are thrown away or

given to others. I can classify three types of weddings gifts in Russia according to their usefulness: tchotchkes, things for the home, and money.

The first type of wedding gifts in Russia according to their usefulness is tchotchkes. The most common gifts in this category are statuettes, paintings, and candles. Many people consider tchotchkes to be useless gifts. My rational mother calls all tchotchkes except

jewelry "dust collectors". If you've ever held a statuette of a cat or cute children or a couple of doves, you understood that it wasn't a very useful thing. Some people like to give paintings to newlyweds. The usefulness of this gift is difficult to assess. One day, my friend Masha and her fiancé received their portrait for the wedding. It was nice, and they were pleased. Another bride and groom got a terrible picture in dark tones, on which there was an abandoned house in the forest. The newlyweds didn't hang this picture in their house. On our wedding day, my husband and I received two candles as a gift. One candle was in the form of a hugging couple, and the other was in the form of kissing pigeons. We thanked the people and I

don't remember where we put these "valuables". I'm not against tchotchkes as gifts. Some of them are able to please newlyweds, but in my opinion, often their usefulness is minimal.

The second type of weddings gifts in Russia according to their usefulness is things for the home. The most common gifts in this category are bed linens, dishes, and household appliances. Every

> couple I know, as well as me, got something in this category. Usually, these things are very useful and necessary gifts for the groom and the bride. It is good if family members and friends of newlyweds agree among themselves what gift each of them is going to give. I know an example of when guests didn't do it, and the newlyweds received a gift of three coffee sets. Two sets of bed linen were received at the wedding of my other friends, but this wasn't a problem because it was necessary to have many sets of bed linen at home.

Household appliances are also a common and useful gift. For example, my husband and I were grateful to my grandmother for a coffee maker. Things for a house are useful, enjoyable, and reasonable gifts for a young couple because they are just beginning to furnish their home.

The third type of weddings gifts in Russia according to their usefulness is money. Money is the most useful and desirable gift of all. A couple themselves decides how to spend the amount received. Some newlyweds spend money on a honeymoon, others partially pay the cost of organizing the wedding, and others invest the money into buying a house. Some newlyweds openly say that they want to



receive money as a gift. Of course, no one talks about how much money guests should give, so it's up to them. I think money is convenient for both guests and newlyweds. Guests don't have to puzzle over the gift, and the newlyweds know best what they need to buy with this money. In my experience and the experience of my married friends, money is now the most common gift for a wedding in Russia.

touching event. Newlyweds and their friends and relatives are preparing for this day. Gifts and congratulations are remembered for many years, but some gifts are more in demand in life. 
ESL.

Day Shift Versus Night Shift

People often have to choose to work at night or to work during a day shift. Have you ever chosen what shift is the best for you to work? Did you compare them? Two years ago, when I had to choose either to work day shifts or work at night, I could not make up my mind. Even though I had a few friends who worked during the day and on night shifts and who gave me some advice about work, they did not help me come to a decision at all. I wanted to go college, but I needed money to

live on. However, after I compared the opportunity to study, the free time, and the health considerations, I was eventually able to arrive at my decision to work during the day shift. Curiously, there are many differences between working the day shift and working at night.

in most cases, rush to work in the evenings and sleep after work, in the morning, when families should have breakfast together. They usually wake up at noon while the children and the other members of the family are at work. Therefore, there is not enough time for night workers to communicate with family, even though both a day shift and a night shift are eight hours long. I work during the day because I believe that spending time with family and sleeping at night are the most



important things. In contrast to the day shift, working at night isolates a person from family, children, and friends. For instance, my friend Anna worked nights and did not have enough time to spend with the children. As

The first difference between a day shift and a night shift is having spare time to communicate with family and friends. Working during the day time gives more opportunities to go out with friends or visit relatives because most people work day shifts and usually get together in the late evenings. I sometimes go to an Italian restaurant with my friends after work to have fun and share the news; however, when I worked nights, I could not meet with them because I had to go work in the evenings. In addition to that, people who work during daytime can have dinner and then breakfast with the spouse and children, which makes the family stronger. Unlike, on day shifts, people working on the night shifts,

a result, her son started smoking marijuana and found bad "friends". Unlike working during the day, the night shift has a big impact on the family, especially relationships with children or between spouses.

Another difference between working during the day shift and working at night is an opportunity to find a job and go to college. People who do not have any experience, work skills, or knowledge of English, find it hard to find a job on a day shift. My nephew applied for a job at a hospital many times and after nine month of waiting, he was able to find just a night shift job. Most people in general want to have a day shift job. I work during the day because I want to sleep at

night and spend time in the evenings and mornings with people I love. However, before I got day shifts from the manager, I worked at night for one year. Furthermore, all nurses I know told me that after they graduated, they could not find a day shift job, only night shift. Whereas a day shift job is harder to find, a night shift job is easier to get because usually people do not want to work at

night. However, unlike working during the day, the night shift has fewer things to do because there are fewer customers, phone calls, and visitors. Therefore, it is easier to find a night job and the work at night is easier as well.

A final and an extremely important difference between a day shift and a

night shift is the influence on a person's health. Working during the day is right for a human's biological clock. After sunrise, the human brain starts producing a hormone that helps people stay awake and be energetic. Studies shows that people who work during the day are healthier than people who work at night. In addition, in contrast to the day workers, the night workers have hazards which include sleepiness on the job, fatigue, and restlessness. My friend Alex says, "Fatigue decreases safety." Many of us share the road with exhausted night workers who are very dangerous for drivers. One of my colleagues at work told me that her son died in a car accident.

She explained to me that her son worked nights as a drug (medicine) delivery driver. While he was driving, he fell asleep and collided with another car. On top of that, according to the scientific study "How Work at Night Impacts Health", in the US and Europe, working on the night shift" runs counter to the body's natural circadian rhythm." The scientist approved the fact that people who

work at night have more chance to have heart disease, chronic fatigue, and constant headache. Therefore, working at night is worse for our body and mental condition.

In conclusion, communication with family and friends in people's free time, an opportunity to find a job, and the influence on health are important differences between working during the day shift and working at night. Humans were created to sleep at night and work during the day. People who work at night drink

a lot of coffee, drink tea with sugar to stay awake at night, and take drugs that help them fall asleep in the morning. They just harm their health. After a lot of thinking, I am sure I made the right deci-

sion to choose to work the day shift.


The next major step is to think about the image of your camel. You should remember that the attractiveness of your camel

contest. My warning for you – you can get so carried away preparing your camel that you will forget about the charm of women. Is the beauty of a camel more important for you?





Culture Clash

Dragonwings, by Laurence Yep, takes place in America, the Land of the Golden Mountain, in the beginning of the twentieth century. The main character, Moon Shadow, came from China to San Francisco to see his father and met with a completely different culture of white demons. Undoubtedly, the interaction of such different cultures could not be without misunderstandings and conflicts. In fact, one of the most significant themes in this book is cultural clash.

One example of cultural clash in Dragon-wings is a different understanding of the nature of dragons. For Americans, the dragon was a symbol of evil and danger for people. Those who could kill these creatures were considered saints. Moon Shadow saw this vision of the dragon on the stained-glass window when he was visiting Miss Whitlow. He was terrified

because for the Chinese the dragon is a symbol of their nation. They see them as intelligent, powerful, and kind to people. The boy could not accept the wrong way of demon thinking and was determined to tell the truth about dragons to Miss Whitlow. He was delighted with how open she was to his culture and how she was interested in learning about people as people. As a result, she told him, "Perhaps the truth of the dragon lies somewhere in between the American and the Chinese versions." This wise woman showed the boy an example of tolerance and acceptance of other cultures, which helps to communicate with people and prevent misunderstandings and conflicts.

Using many examples of cultural clash, Laurence Yep showed in his book that people who grew up in different ways see the same things with different truth. However, if people are open and tolerant of other cultures, then there are no obstacles to communication between them.

It is impossible to determine exactly how

many cultures there are in the world because each culture is defined not only by its language, but also by traditions, religion, norms, and other elements. They are not isolated from each other, and this often leads to such a phenomenon as cultural clash. As I began to live in the U.S., I experienced cultural clashes many times. One of them for me was a different approach in the education system. For example, when my son was in the first grade, his teacher asked me one day to talk with him. It turned out that my son wrote the letters very neatly and,

accordingly, very slowly, so the whole class had to wait for him and could not complete all tasks on time. I was very embarrassed because it was I who taught my son to write this way, believing that it influences his assessments. In elementary schools of the countries of post Soviet Union, it is important to write neatly. You can do all the work correctly, but if the handwriting

is inaccurate, students never get a high score. In the U.S., on the contrary, the result and ability to think is more important. I acted based on those cultural norms that were practiced in my native country, and I did not know that it prevented my son from focusing on more important things in his studying in the U.S. This situation is not only about the importance of understanding the American education system in order to help children assimilate in a new culture. This also shows that even insignificant things can lead to a cultural clash.

The consequences of cultural clash can be many. Some situations may be just ridiculous. Others can cause bewilderment or even conflicts. To avoid serious misunderstandings, people should be open to other cultures and be tolerant of people regardless of their nationality, religion, views, or outlook. Especially if one lives in another culture, it is necessary to learn, understand, and accept it. As they say, "When in Rome, do as the Romans do."

ESL Classes at ARC Should Be Limited to Twenty Students per Class

American River is a very popular community college. ARC has a great variety of career programs and an ESL program for non-native English speakers. People can start from beginning level and progress to advanced. I have an opportunity to get an education here. I have spent one year at ARC and it is not a bad place, but there are some disadvantages. For example, ESL classes are overcrowded. I totally agree with the idea that ESL classes at ARC should be limited to twenty students per class.

The first reason why classes should be limited is there is simply not enough space for students in classrooms. For example, if you come late by a couple of minutes, it is very hard to find a place to sit. Usually, students don't like to change their seats. I remem-

names from around the world. It is the same for me because I don't know every classmate's name from my class. It is very uncomfortable for me. For instance, in my writing class I can't catch office hours for feedback from our teacher. When

I tried to get face to face with my teacher, I could not because there were very big lines. I believe that ESL classes at ARC should be limited to twenty students per class. Let's do something for our college!



I thought that I was going to die inside my apartment without saying goodbye to my family and friends, but I didn't die. After a few minutes, the earthquake stopped. I will never forget that moment of my life. It is hard to explain when something happens like that. I just had a very terrible feeling and surprise when the earth-

quake suddenly happened.

Most people were running away from the earthquake to find a safe place to go. When I saw people on the streets, some people were even half naked because they did not have time to get dressed. There were a lot of people on the phone calling their families and friends. Everybody was

shocked, surprised, and unhappy. It was on their faces. Some people were trying to help others who were under buildings. The streets were full of ambulances and police cars. Everybody wanted to try to help and save lives.

In conclusion, I will never forget this terrible earthquake in my life. Nobody died in my apartment building, but nine hundred eighty-one people died in the Istanbul earthquake. Generally, in the Marmara region of Turkey about 17,000 people died from the earthquake in 1999 in Turkey. A lot of people lost their homes and more prop-

erty. If you are at home and living on the 11th floor of an apartment, and you have no time to leave, what would you do?

"It was pretty weird looking," she said. "I've never seen anything like that. It was quite interesting."

Grams' husband died five years ago, a month after their 60th wedding anniversary.

She told BBC that her husband was a jokester so she

Volunteer for story time

Carve out some time to volunteer during story hour at the neighborhood library, Kristi suggests. "I had to practice and get used to reading aloud to children, but once you get the hang of it, it's so much fun," Kristi admits. "When you see the expressions on their faces, you really feel you're making a difference." And it goes without saying you should read to your own kids, too!

Tutor a child

Many childhood literacy groups also run programs in which a volunteer reading partner is matched with a child who struggles to read. Often a structured lesson plan is also provided to help students learn specific skills needed to become proficient readers.

Donate to a community program

Take some time to research and identify nonprofit childhood literacy organizations with missions you're interested in supporting. Your monetary contribution can aid in the distribution of books to low-income communities and fund vital reading programs.

Middle Eastern Shawarma!



Shawarma is thinly sliced cuts of meat, like chicken, beef, goat, lamb, and sometimes turkey rolled into a large piece of flatbread

1- Heat olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add beef, shawarma seasoning, allspice, and 1/2 teaspoon salt; cook, turning occasionally, until beef is browned and tender, 3 to 5 minutes.

2- Whisk tahini, yogurt, lemon juice, and 1/2 teaspoon salt together in a small bowl until creamy.

3- Spread 1 to 2 tablespoons tahini sauce in the center of each tortilla. Divide beef slices, tomato slices, and onion slices evenly among tortillas. Roll up tortillas.

<u>Ingredients:</u>

- * 1 tablespoon olive oil
- * 1 pound beef top sirloin, thinly sliced
- * 1 tablespoon shawarma seasoning
- *1 teaspoon ground allspice
- * 1/2 teaspoon salt

- *1/2 lemon, juiced
- * 1/2 teaspoon salt
- * 1 (10 ounce) package large flour tortillas
- * 2 tomatoes, halved and sliced
- * 1 onion, thinly sliced

4- Preheat a panini press according to manufacturer's instructions. Press rolled tortillas seam side-down until grill marks appear, about 2 minutes. Cut each tortilla into 4 to 5 pieces.



health) assessments and referrals, health screenings (Blood Pressure and TB skin tests), literature and pamphlets on numerous health topics, free condoms, immunizations (TDAP, HepB, MMR, Varicella), lab referrals for blood titers, health insurance information, smoking cessation information, and drug and alcohol abuse information.

The Parrot: Are all services free?

Arnott: There is a fee for TB skin tests, immunizations, and blood titers.

The Parrot: Who can be seen at the Health Center?

Arnott: Currently-enrolled students (within Los Rios) as well as staff may utilize the Health Center.

The Parrot: Who staffs the Health Center?

Arnott: The ARC Health Center is staffed by two Masters-prepared registered nurses (Michele Arnott

& Pam Whipple) and one Health Assistant (Ryan Nix).

The Parrot: What difference is there between a nurse in The Health Center and a nurse in a regular clinic?

Arnott: Los Rios College Nurses are required to hold Master's degrees; this is generally not the case for other types of clinics. Also, the Los Rios College nurse role is more diverse than many clinic nurses. We are more integrated into the college community and do more program planning and administrative work than the average clinic nurse roles. Even among community college nurses and health centers, there are different models of staffing and service.

The Parrot: Do students need an appointment to see a nurse?

Arnott: Monday through Thursday no appointments are necessary; it is purely walk-in. On Fridays, RNs are available by appointment only.

The Parrot: What if students just need nutrition\ dietary advice or sexual health information or just emotional counseling?

Arnott: We encourage students with these types of concerns to meet with an RN in the Health Center. The RN can assess the level of care needed and if it can't be provided in the Health Center, a referral to a community resource can be made.

The Parrot: Can students get prescriptions from the ARC Health Center?

Arnott: Some over the counter medications are available at the Health Center but prescriptions and prescription medications are not available.

The Parrot: Does the staff ever visit classrooms to give information or advice?

Arnott: The RNs have gone into classrooms to speak on specific topics per a professor's request. Due to the Health Center's limited staffing, it is challenging for the RNs to leave the Health Center but when possible the RNs really enjoy participating in outreach/educational efforts throughout the campus.

The Parrot: Would you give some advice to students on how to maintain their health?


Arnott: Health involves a balance of both physi-

cal and emotional/mental health. So much can be said about this. It is best to start with the basics and focus on moderation. Eat a balanced diet and enjoy the "not so healthy" foods in moderation. I can't say enough about sleep and how important it is to get enough sleep (8 hrs/night is the goal). Turning off all electronics/avoiding screen time (computers, TV, cell phone) at least 30 minutes before going to bed and avoiding caffeine at least 3 hours before going to bed will help to prepare you for a good night's sleep. Some of the risks related to lack of sleep include decreased immune system, decrease in judgement/ability to concentrate, higher stress levels, and increased irritability. Exercise within moderation will help you improve your physical health and can provide benefits to mental health as well. Exercise produces endorphins, "feel-good brain chemicals", that can elevate your mood and help reduce levels of stress. Enroll for health insurance so you can develop a relationship with your primary care provider. Wash your hands often. Get the flu shot every year.

Out of the Cage

Alfred Eichler: Art & Architecture in the Golden State Tuesday, August 28 2018 9:30 am - 4:00 pm

Like many state architects, Alfred Eichler's name is not widely known, yet the structures he designed reflect the everyday lives of many Californians – schools, hospitals, office buildings, prisons, border inspection stations, bridges, historic restoration projects, and state parks and fairgrounds. Eichler often worked on a structure from concept to completion, although some of his project designs were never built or were modified before construction. At times, Eichler's artwork was based on designs by other architects, illustrating how a building might look once completed.

The architectural drawings and paintings featured in this exhibition were created by Alfred Eichler from 1925 to 1962. The selections are drawn from the Alfred Eichler Collection, within the Architecture Division of the Department of Public Works records housed at the California State Archives. Eichler utilized a variety of styles and art media to create these pieces. Each one is an example of the Golden State's efforts to address the needs of a diverse and growing population through public projects.
