effects of spending too much money, but the most important of these are temporary happiness, inability to achieve goals, and debt.



A worldwide pandemic started because of COVID-19 and before I got familiar with the environment and knew how to study or do my assignments, all inperson classes were canceled and online classes began. Everything was out of its normal condition,

and every one had to change themselves according to the new conditions. It was not easy even for professors to adapt to new ways of teaching methods and using technology. I remember that I didn't know how to use Canvas. I was so confused, and I didn't even do my assignments. I even didn't know that we had an assignment. That sounds funny and also sad at the same time because when the professor turned in our final grades, I got a D and I was shocked. As it was a speaking and listening class, my expectations were high for having more practice of speaking to each other. I was wondering if I would have enough practice for speaking and listening so I could speak with my classmates and build my speaking skill. But we didn't have that opportunity as the class changed to online and we didn't see each other in person and

my problem went on.

By the way, the year ended with all the hardships, but I couldn't take classes for fall semester since I was expecting a baby. Because of this, I missed a whole semester which continued to set me behind. Again, I started in spring 2021 with ESL 55 and ESL G51. We had many issues with using Canvas and doing our assignments. Everyone was

still trying to adapt to online classes and the use of technology was not easy, especially for those who were not familiar with computers. As the class was online, the professor couldn't control everyone. If any student cheated on exams, it was out of the professor's control and it made us in some ways lazy and persuaded us not to study as much as was needed. Some of my classmates just turned their cameras off and they did their other work. Some days we lost internet connection, and sometimes we had to deal with background noises. At that time, my baby was just a few months old and some days we were studying together. Sometimes he was playing with my computer and would unmute or turn on the



camera to say hello. But, I couldn't unmute myself to participate in exercises or ask and answer the questions because sometimes my baby wasn't sleeping and was crying. I tried my best to have focused studying at home, but especially with children, it made it more challenging with all the noise. Also, we couldn't have discussions and exchange our ideas about the readings and our writing assignments. Somehow we learned some basics about academic writing and reading with the help of professor Sanda Valcu. Although the professors were trying their best, unfortunately it didn't meet my expectations, but fortunately I was still able to pass the class and move to the next level.

I didn't want to miss the opportunity for fall

classes and I enrolled in ESLL 310 and ESL 315. In person classes were not available, so we had to continue online classes. As the level was going up, it made everything more difficult. When my baby was growing, he got more active and sometimes did dangerous activities, so I couldn't leave him alone, and yet my

class requirements and assignments were increasing and made the situation worse. Sometimes I even thought about dropping the classes. I was not able to continue like this taking care of my baby and at the same time having to focus on the class in Zoom. We had started writing a summary of stories and that was very hard for me to understand because it was my first time to read a story and the vocabulary and sentence structure was too hard. We had to write essays about things that were off the top of my head and things that we didn't have information about. For example, I will never forget an essay about genetics. I worked on that essay for two days and I hoped for a 100, but I was only able to get an 89. I revised it and made some progress, but it wasn't enough and still frustrating, and that day I cried. I decided to not study anymore. While all of this was happening at the same time, taking a 6-unit integrated class was only made more difficult by a 3-unit listening class that I wasn't prepared for. My first listening class was in a rush and I couldn't learn anything from that class. ESL L310 could be counted as my first experience of listening and speaking. I had no idea of sounds, pronunciations and some special expressions like schwa. Every time that I submitted my records it had many mistakes. Even though I learned a lot from these classes, it was really challenging and I almost to gave up. Fortunately, American River College announced that classes for the next semester would be in person and we could attend college if we had been vaccinated.

In this semester, Fall 2022, fortunately things are getting better and we could attend college in person classes. I got ESL 325. Now we can study and learn face to face and have more conversations. Being in a real class feels much better because now I can know what "class" really means, and I am very happy to be in an educational environment. My

problem is solved now.
We can have lots of discussions, peer reviews,
group work, timed writing in class, and reading
together that really help

How I Found Myself Redressed

It seems to many that emigration to America is such a ticket to life, a golden ticket that you pulled out, and life is about to sparkle with new colors if not in the first days, then certainly very soon. However, the reality is somewhat pretty different. In fact, the path from the moment of arrival to full adaptation is quite hard on the mental health of those who move. Everyone goes through it in their own way, but for no one it is easy.

Three years ago I moved to the USA. Six months later I had to register in Viber, and almost immediately I received a message: "Where are you from here? You died..." A man

named George wrote that he had recently buried

his aunt, and her phone number is now mine. There was some truth in that for me too: moving to anothe country is no doubt deathlike.

The move was forced: the law which was supposed to protect me began to work against me to please those who persecuted me. Three days passed from the decision I should fly to takeoff. Of my

four children, I could take only the two younger ones. The other two daughters were just married and had to stay. I had one more buried in that land. Should I ever explain how heartbreaking it was for me to leave?

We landed in Los Angeles. Los Angeles is certainly great. I experienced something like a"honeymoon" there for a week, until I had to move to Sacramento where the bureaucracy began. It was quite a challenge for me to be doing that much at the same time.

Being undocumented, I was looking for an appartment to rent, trying to find any possible job, registrering children for school, filling out all that immigration paperwork. Even finding the food we were used to turned out to be a quest. It wasn't unreal, but it was too energy-consuming. Over time, I got housing and work, but this did not make my life much easier. Being the only breadwinner in the family, I generally lived at work and came home only for a couple of hours per day. I had no time to exhale and calmly realize what was happenning. But no matter how difficult it was to go through all that, the worst was ahead.

When everyday issues gradually improved, the language was mastered, a better paid job was found, emptiness set in. It was the hardest thing for me to part with the status and the feeling of myself. This is the most difficult thing to erase yourself completely and to realize yourself again in new conditions, to find a different yourself here, beyond those past blessings. And it's only after you find yourself in a new place that you realize to the full what you have left behind. Before leaving your country, a beautiful picture appears in your head of how you will live in the new place. But you don't think at all about what you will leave in the homeland. You finally

realize it only when you are already there. You find yourself out of culture, out of friends, out of everything. It is a complete social downshift. With any move, you remain as if naked, you need to redress yourself.

Being "naked" made me feel very uncomfortable, and conquering the feeling of bitterness in myself, I tried my best to dress up. The process was slow and

I didn't seem to be making any headway until it happened that an old friend of mine came to America. She looked so helpless, and I literally had to lead her by hand on every issue that appeared. She never stopped thanking me for the help, but if only she knew that I got so much more from her than I gave. I felt myself in contrast with her. I suddenly realized that my life had been pretty long in America. It is no longer a stranger to me. Local realities became transparent and understandable. Difficulties that arise are not perceived as acutely as at the beginning. At least I know how to find information to deal with issues. Words of a Feather Learning Possibility & Probability

Can--Could--May--Might--Must Shall--Should--Will--Would

Do you know what type of words these are? They're modal verbs.

These modal verbs are auxiliary verbs, just like *be, do* and *have* because they work together with a main verb.

You almost always have a modal verb with a main verb, and the main verb that follows is always in the bare infinitive form – without *to*.

For example:

- I could go..
- You should take...
- They would like...
- Paul may borrow...

These modal verbs are used in English to express something. They have a purpose, and we need to try and understand that purpose today. They can be used to talk about possibility and probability. To talk about how likely something is.

You can use these modal verbs to express how likely it is that that action will happen? Are you certain? If

you're sure, you're confident that will happen, you can say:

• It will happen.

Is it probable? Is it likely to happen? Is there a good chance it will happen?

•It should happen.

Is it possible?

·It can happen.

Or is it unlikely?

•It couldn't happen.

In all of these situations, you can use a modal verb to explain how certain you are that something will happen, how possible something is. In addittion, these same modal verbs can also be used to explain 'ability'— how able you are to do something. They can be used to ask permission, make requests and offer help.





Eat the World!

The Parrot represents students of many hues and sounds --- no news there. Indeed, birds of a feather flock together, right? They also eat together. The Parrot is proud to present Parrot fodder from around the world in this and subsequent issues. Squawk!

Qabuli Palaw/Kabuli Palaw



Qabuli Palaw is one of the most famous traditional dishes of Afghanistan. This dish is considered a festive and important dish due to the price and unique quality of its ingredients. Usually this dish is one of the must-have dishes in all Afghan parties, ceremonies and occasions. However, Afghan people often prepare this food at home for regular meals as well.

INGREDIENTS:

Mutton stock:

1 Medium onion Mutton - 1 kg Salt - 4 tsp Ginger Garlic Paste - 2 tsp Coriander Seeds - 2 tsp Water - 3 cups

Rice:

Rice - 3 cups Salt - 1 tsp Garam Masala - 2 tsp Oil - 1/2 cup

Additional:

3 Medium Carrots Raisins - 200 gr Sugar - 1 tbsp; Salt - 2 tsp

DIRECTIONS:

Pre-heat pan to medium-high, add oil

and thinly sliced carrots. Fry carrots 5-7 mins. Remove fried carrots from the oil; add pre-washed, dried raisins to heated oil. Fry raisins till brown.

Pre-heat another pot to medium-high, add oil and onion; cook until onion turns dark golden-brown. Next, add mutton. Cook 5-7 minutes. Add salt, ginger garlic paste, coriander seeds and water. Mix and cook 5 mins. on high heat, then 20 mins. on medium. Pre-heat a new pan to medium-high and add sugar. When sugar turns brown, add the broth and salt and mix.

Soak 3 cups long grain white rice in lukewarm water for 2 hours before cooking. In new pan, boil water and add salt and the soaked rice. Let rice boil 3-4 mins. then drain. Add the broth from the other pan to the drained rice. Mix the broth with the rice gently to make sure not to break rice. Add fried oil on top of rice and add the mutton on one side of the pan. Put garam masala on rice and then add fried carrots and raisins on the other side of pot. Cover the boiler top with a clean fabric and put it on the pan. Cook 5 mins. over medium-high. Reduce heat to low. Cook 15 mins. Qabuli Palaw is now ready, but it needs to be placed on the plate in a special order.

First, take out the mutton, carrots and raisins from top of rice. Mix rice and place on plate. Put mutton on top of rice on plate, and then add cooked carrots and raisins on plate with the mutton and rice. Finally, Qabuli Palaw is ready to be served. It is worth mentioning that different people have different methods of designing the plates to serve Qabuli Palaw.

and welcoming students who may have just come back to campus for face-to-face classes for the first time in Fall 2022. I wanted to be visible and let our employee educators and community of learners know that I was here, especially since we as a campus were navigating our environment while still in a pandemic.

In your own words, would you mind telling us what a Dean of Humanities does?

Dean Porter: We support instruction, programs and services to meet the needs of students. Please notice I said, "we" as I'm not the only dean on our campus and have a great team of colleagues who support both instruction and programming. I also want to recognize our division support (Liliya Dorofevey, Administration Assistant and Jessica Graves, Clerk III as well as student workers) who also serve and support the needs of the division so we can show up to support learning for our students. I would say, as a dean, I serve instruction, support instruction and programs, and I want to make sure that we are on hand to do what needs to be done as a division so that we're serving students. I also have to make sure that we represent the individual and collective needs of our community of learners, and make sure they all feel valued and heard.

Why did you choose ARC instead of another college?

Dean Porter: ARC is student-focused, and I was able to see this in researching the college through the website, visiting the campus and talking to colleague's who had worked or knew someone from ARC/Los Rios District. ARC cares about students and the values and vision align with my values as an educator.

What, if any, challenges have you had adjusting to your new work environment?

Dean Porter: I call challenges "opportunities for growth." My opportunities for growth are learning about ARC, meeting my colleagues, and getting to know students and our community of learners. I'm trying to meet and get to know our ARC community as well as our other colleagues in our district.

How long did it take you to complete your various college degrees?

Dean Porter: I want to first say that education is a journey. It took me five years for my undergraduate degree, two years for my Master's degree and five years to obtain my Doctorate. I want to share my experience prior to going to college as it lends to why I chose the educational path I did. I remember my high school counselor sitting down with me and another classmate going over our test scores to get into college. I wasn't a great test taker, and my high school counselor told me based on my scores, "You should probably go into waitressing." I was like, "not going to college?" She was just like, "No, that's not for you." I didn't allow her perception of what I should do change want I wanted to do by going to college. I also wanted to prove her wrong, so I took hard classes to make me a better student and learner. My family also encouraged me and my siblings to do more than what they had the opportunity to do.

What inspired you to go into the educational/



teaching field?

Dean Porter: I wanted to be a teacher and encourage students to reach their full potential in whatever field of study contrary to the experience I mentioned I had with a high school counselor in high school.

Did you face any particular difficulties during

your learning journey? Dean Porter: My parents couldn't afford to assist me financially but did support me emotionally. So I took out student loans, like many students do, because I realized that education is the key to get you to where you need to be and to compete with other people. Being in spaces where sometimes I was the only person of color, based on my educational level, sometimes I was passed up for jobs. I was not getting the same job opportunities as colleagues who did not share the same ethnicity and experiences I had. I don't want to be an exception. I want those in higher education to be practitioners of inclusion by valuing the differences that make us better as educators and learners.

How did your family feel about your decision to go into this field? Did they ever want you to do something else?

Dean Porter: No, I always loved teaching and helping my other peer educators. I was a mentor to younger students as I began to love teaching. Teaching was always something I thought I'd do.

Are you into any kinds of art? If so, what?

Dean Porter: In my spare time I like to make spaces feel welcoming. I used to work online, way before the pandemic. I created a background in my office that was inviting to the students I was teaching as we met virtually. I love elephants and butterflies, so I always try to include pieces of art of elephants and butterflies in the spaces I create. I wish I was

more artsy, but I'm not! I remember one time I took pottery classes and I tried to make a bowl, but it just fell over. It's so hard! I have to say, a good hobby of mine is reading. I try to read multiple books at the same time. Reading isn't only informative but also fun!

Do you speak or have you studied any language other than English?

Dean Porter: I studied American Sign Language in my undergraduate studies, French in high school, and a little bit of Spanish in my career experiences.

Are there any languages you would like to learn? Which one? Why?

Dean Porter: Spanish! I'd love to go to Mexico one day so I can not only

learn Spanish but also practice it with native speakers and learn the culture.

How did you feel when you were asked to be interviewed for *The Parrot*?

Dean Porter: I feel honored and privileged because I know this goes to students. I've read *The Parrot* before and I love what *The Parrot* does for our community of learners!

What hobbies do you like to do in your off-time?



Dean Porter: I do love to cook and I love to eat. Normally, when I have time and space, I spend it cooking not only for me but for my family and friends, because for me, food is a way to express your love and your compassion for somebody.

What is your go-to snack?

Dean Porter: Good question. I love popcorn. I try not to eat much of it though, since it gets stuck in
