The Great Debate: ESL Summer Classes



More ESL Classes in the Summer? Yes! Yes! Yes!

American River College has different ESL courses that are offered during the summer in different areas, including the ESL Center. These courses are only eight weeks long, so they could be more intense and even harder for some students. Even though many students prefer to keep busy and update their knowledge of the language because many of them are immigrants, they prefer to take these classes because

they can do it in a very short time. However, sometimes not all the courses that students want or need exist. So, ARC should offer more ESL courses at more levels over the summer to help students get ahead with classes, finish their goals, and take advantage of their time.

There should be more classes at more levels because there are not enough. ARC could implement more classes to encourage students to continue studying. Students are more likely to

More ESL Classes in the Summer? No! No! No!

Studying English is important to every ESL student. ARC offers many ESL courses to help ESL students master English even during summer break. Recently, the number of courses has come into focus. Some students think the summer courses are enough, but others do not

think so. This year, the administration at ARC has decided to offer three ESL classes (G31, G41, and G51) and four lab classes at the ESL Center for four weeks during the summer session of classes. The ESL classes all have waiting lists currently. There are also available seats within the online ESL Center. Of course, the courses are not plenti-

ful as in other semesters. Nevertheless, the ARC administration should not allow the ESL Department to offer more ESL courses in the summer because having a break and practice are more important than the number of classes, and the most important thing is the summer courses are literally enough.

A popular opinion against offering more courses is that professors and students need the summer break. In general, summer break is designed to give professors and students a break. Going through a semester of hard work, both professors and students are quite tired. Taking a rest will be good for the next semester. Another particular reason is that most ESL students are immigrants who want to return to their home country to be with their families during the summer break. In fact, most students do

not have extra time to take ESL courses in the summer, so it is unnecessary to offer more ESL courses.

Another argument against more summer courses is that learning a language requires not only more courses, but also more practice. After studying grammar, reading, writing, and listening for a whole semester, it is time for students to practice those skills. Summer

tice those skills. Summer break is a suitable time to do this. Students can practice English through part-time jobs or internships during the summer break. On the other hand, although it is a good choice to learn English through ESL courses, some students also believe that it is an excellent supplement to choose their favorite ways to learn English flexibly during the summer break. More practice or favorite ways rather than more courses can help

students master English better. Thus, it is not a



good choice to offer more ESL classes during the summer break.

Even though many students do not need more ESL courses, some people are concerned that there will not be enough ESL courses during the summer break. However, these concerns are unnecessary. While there are fewer ESL courses than in spring or fall, there is also less demand. According to the ARC official website data, as of April 23, 2023, there are 14 available seats at the ESL Center and even 41 waiting list seats in total. And if these are still not enough, there are available seats in all five ESL courses at the SCC campus. Any ARC stu-

dent can enroll in these courses. According to this statistical data, most of the needs are being met.







guage of the indigenous people of Morocco formerly known in English as "Berber") means "the place of storage." UNESCO classifies the IGODAR building as a World Heritage site.

So what is the IGODAR?

"IGODAR" is an Amazigh word that can also be translated as "collective warehouses or fortresses." These are huge buildings fortified with high walls and watch towers. They were designed on high peaks to be difficult to access and to be able to withstand wartime or any external attacks.

One building contains nearly 300 rooms distributed over 20 corridors: within each corridor are storage rooms on three floors. The ground and second floors are for foodstuffs, and the upper third is for valuables, such as jewelry and important documents.



In addition to other facilities such as a mosque and housing for the guards, as well as a place for livestock in case of war, there are five watch towers for guarding and tightening administrative control.

According to the Moroccan Ministry of Culture, there are 554 Igodar buildings in Morocco. Remarkably, some of them are still operating in the same traditional way. The residents of those regions are trying to preserve this heritage from extinction.

When was the IGODAR built? Why is it the oldest banking system in the world? The IGODAR is an ancient building, but the date of its construction is not known precisely. Still, most researchers suggest that its construction dates back to the beginning of the 12th century, and there are those who

date its construction back much older than that.

Many specialists believe that the Igodar is the oldest banking system known to mankind, and this proposition is due to the economic, financial, administrative, and political roles played by this facility. In this context, a researcher who specializes in the history of IGODAR, Khaled Al-Aywad, said to Al-Jazeera.net "that the inhabitants of the Amazigh regions have been guided to this method for centuries, to store the surplus crop in the years of prosperity in order to resort to it in the years of drought, and also to store their precious things such as silver ornaments and marriage contracts, as well as some

foodstuffs such as olive oil and ghee. The researcher concluded that IGODAR is the oldest banking system known to mankind before it appeared in Europe."

By examining this building, we notice that this archaeological landmark was built with a unique architecture that helps preserve food for years without damage, namely grain and oil crops,

and even jewelry, antiques, and valuables. Also, this bank was built on top of a mountain fortress to ensure effective control of the "institution" and the preservation of the property that the leaders of the tribe supervise and dispose of, according to laws regulating the warehouse.

An agreed percentage is deducted from each individual's commodity for the use of the IGO-DAR each year. The funds are allocated for restoration, management, and guard salaries.

The management of this facility is subject to an administrative system based on the principle of election, where an annual meeting is held in which the administrative board is selected to ensure the smooth functioning of the bank following what is





known as the warehouse constitution.

IGODAR was built with materials extracted from the local environment, such as mud, wood, and stones, and some were built as caves high in the mountains.

In addition to the economic roles of the IGODAR, it also had political roles, as it became a symbol of order, power, control, urbanization, and modern society. Therefore, all successive political regimes that ruled Morocco paid great attention to it. The official tools of power in Morocco such as the army, police, judiciary, and administration are still known as "Makhzen," which is the Arabic translation

of the Amazigh word "IGODAR." Also, one of the largest cities in Morocco, Agadir, (which is the singular form of IGODAR) was named after these warehouses.

The Importance of a Wide Angle Lens

When it comes to photographing beautiful scenes and views, you often want to be able to capture as much of the scene as possible, and that's when wide angle lenses come in handy. A wide angle lens (a lens that goes from 12mm to 18mm focal length) allows you to get a broader point of view of whatever scene you are trying to capture, and lets you get creative with your shots. But the wider the lens, the more distorted the corners; thus, trying to find new angles and perspectives is always important.

As you can see in the two photos above, by shooting with a wide angle lens and taking advantage of the distortion of the lens I was using, I was able to get the lupine in a new perspective compared to the other image that I took at 24mm, which has the same field that you get from your phone camera.

If you want to improve your photography, getting a wide angle lens might help you accomplish that goal.



Words of a Feather Participial Adjectives

There are two types of participial adjectives: one comes from the verb's present participle (-ing form) and the other comes from the past participle (-ed/-en form, but often irregular). Take the verbs confuse and fall as an example:



While the forms derive from a verb (to confuse; to fall), they can function as adjectives to describe a noun. Note that not all verbs can do this; you can check whether the verb you want to use can describe a noun by searching for word combinations in online published writing, books, magazines, newspapers, or academic journals.

Using participial adjectives can help reduce wordiness from multiple phrases.


Example: Making friends can help you create connections in case you need to copy notes or ask for information on something you might have missed.

Revision: Making friends can help you create connections in case you need to copy notes or ask for **missed** information.

The phrase on something you might have missed describes the information but is wordy. The only necessary word in this phrase is missed, and this single word can be placed in front of the noun information as an adjective. The revision missed information accurately describes the original sentence and uses fewer words, so it is preferable.

As verbs, the -ing ending indicates the progressive form (also known as the continuous form) and can

only be used in the active voice. The -ed/-en verb ending indicates perfect form and is the form used for passive voice sentences. When verbs become adjectives, they no longer function as verbs but still have a verb-like meaning. As a general pattern, the -ing adjective has an active or continuous meaning, and the -ed/-en adjective has a passive or completed meaning.



Example: Nature provides climbers with this increasing opportunity.

The first example means that the opportunity still has the potential to go up (continuous meaning).

The second example means that the opportunity is higher compared to something else (completed meaning).

Thank you very much. What motivated you to work for long years in a community college, and what do you love the most about your job? Can you share a favorite quote that motivates or inspires you in some way?

Dr. Kobayashi: I can. I went to Santa Rosa Junior College which is a community college in Santa Rosa, two hours from American River college. I was a student just like you and going to community college changed my life. I was able to save lots of money for my family and I was able to then trans-

fer to UC Davis. I taught in Japan, I got a master's from Stanford University, and I started a business. And then I started working at a community college. But everything was possible because of my time at Santa Rosa Junior College. So, what motivates me is that every student that I see, or every student that attends Ameri-

can River College, in many ways is just like me. I see the great hope that American River College gives students. That is why I've been here for a long time. What I love the most about my job is graduation. I love seeing students walk across the stage because the diploma that we give them, whether it be an associate degree, or whether a student transfers, or they get a certificate, signifies or symbolizes that students are reaching their hopes and their dreams. At graduation, students and their families are there cheering them on. So, that is my favorite day of the year. Now about a favorite quote that inspired me. So, my favorite quote is actually in Japanese. It's something that my mother used to tell me: Naseba naro, It is translated to "If you try, you will succeed; if you don't try, you won't succeed, no matter what it is". And I would say that is what my mother shared with my sister and me when we were kids: Always try your best.

So, the end of this question is kind of linking us to the next question. Most Americans are immigrants or are descendants of immigrants. Who are the immigrants in your family story?

Dr. Kobayashi: I would say that I am Japanese-American, and both my father and mother have Japanese background. My father was second generation. His parents (my grandfather and grandmother) came from Japan to America. And then my mother came to America when she was 30. So, she came to

America and spoke very little English.
She attended night school to learn English, and my sister and I helped translate when we were children and still do. And so I was able to learn a lot through my mom because everything was new to her and she had to learn everything as an immigrant here.



American River

College is a diverse community for all students. Currently, students from how many countries background are studying in ARC, and how many languages are spoken in the ARC community?

Dr. Kobayashi: Ah, many. I could probably research the correct answer and get back to you, but I would say many. I know through the applications to the college that we have students from over a hundred different diverse communities. The number of languages spoken are so many.

What are the initiatives and programs that are currently in place regarding ARC working with local businesses and industries to help students get internships or other types of employment while they are studying?

Dr. Kobayashi: Yah, I think that American River Col-

lege has one of the strongest workforce development programs in the state. Many of our programs are in career education and are focused on industry. So, all of our career education programs have advisory boards, and the faculty works with these advisory boards and with members of the business community. All of our departments are connected to industry, and the key, I would say, for all of our students who are interested in work or transfer, is connecting with the faculty. Our faculty can connect students to jobs and business because they have already have those connections. So, the secret is really for our students to connect with faculty, go to office hours and ask these questions.

I heard that you are a person who supports *The Parrot* magazine. What was the reason you decided to help us grow? Now, over 170 issues have been published by *The Parrot*. What does that mean to you?

Dr. Kobayashi: I can't take credit for supporting *The Parrot*. *The Parrot* has been supported by the college for many years and the college will be continuing to support *The Parrot*. I think that, as a college, we want to make sure that we support opportunities for the students to integrate what they learn in the class room with the real world. Being able to learn a new language through ESL and then being able to apply that learning to

know what you are doing here in journalism and also translations and writing. So, I think across the college we have amazing learning opportunities for the students and *The Parrot* is a shining example of that.

Are there any programs that ARC is implementing currently that supports students from diverse background, including first-generation college students and students from minority groups?

Dr. Kobayashi: Absolutely yes. Our Unite Center

and our Student Center have many programs that speak to this question. The Unite Center has various learning communities like Umoja, which supports our African-American communities, Puente program which supports our Latino students, our PRISE program, which supports API students, Pride Center, which supports LGBTQIA + students, and our Native American Resource Center. So, these are the specific programs for those affinity groups and also, we are working to continue to develop our HomeBases. All of our HomeBases work with the Unite Center. Also, our focus is supporting the diversity of our students across the college within each academic HomeBase.

There is a focused interest in supporting our students. We are trying to make our college smaller, as we are very large college with 27,000 students, and to try to create community for all of our students is very important. That is what our HomeBases are trying to do.

What makes community colleges a unique opportunity compared to other types of higher education institutions, and what would you advise to students who are considering attending community colleges?

Dr. Kobayashi: That is a great question. I think that we are an institution of first choice, second chance, opportunity, and hope. What I mean by that is that California State University, or CSU,

accepts somewhere between 15% of our applicants and the UC system takes less than that or less than 10%. California Community Colleges and American River College accepts 100% of the students who are applying here, whether the student is graduating from high school or is a student from another country trying to learn the language, or has worked for a while. What we are is an agent of economic and social mobility. We help students take the next steps in their life. For any students or any person who wants to get a better job to support their family and to reach their hope and dreams,

that is what we do for them.

What was some of the best advice that you received when you were student?

Dr. Kobayashi: I think the best advice was to believe in yourself. Before I went to Stanford, I was very scared, because I did not think that I belonged there, because Stanford is a very prestigious place. What I realized was that, if you believe in yourself, you can always reach your dreams. So, believing in yourself is very important.

Do you have a favorite movie or TV series?

Dr. Kobayashi: I do. My kids and I are watching *The Mandalorian*. Also, my wife and I really enjoy *Yellowstone*

What is your favorite food?

Dr. Kobayashi: Favorite food, that is a hard one. I like all foods and love to eat. I am going to go with a Japanese food called ramen.

Have you travelled outside of United States? Which countries have you traveled to so far?

Dr. Kobayashi: I lived in Japan for 2 years. I have been to South Korea, Australia, New Zealand, Singapore, Malaysia, Italy, Mexico, and Canada.

Besides Japanese food, which other countries' food have you tried and what is your favorite food from other countries?

Dr. Kobayashi: I like all foods. It is a very hard question. So, pasta in Italy, especially in a small town called Vernazza. In South Korea bibimbap

Thank you very much. Besides English what other languages do you speak?

Dr. Kobayashi: I speak Japanese, and I studied Spanish in high school.

What else do you want to share with the students that have not covered in the interview so far?

Dr. Kobayashi: To all of our students, specifically I can speak to our students taking ESL classes, I want them to know that I have the highest level of respect for their courage to come to a new country and learn a new language and culture and work so hard every day. That makes me very proud of every

single one of our ESL students.

I believe the answers you have provided for this interview will inspire lots of students, especially students coming from other countries or having diverse background. It will give them great hope. I really appreciate that. Thank you very much.

Dr. Kobayashi: Thank you for the interview. This was very thoughtful and I appreciate it. You did a great job.





Feet in the Wind: A Look at Moroccan Education

As in other countries, education in my country, Morocco, is not only for acquiring knowledge, but it is also a means of developing everyone's social level. Therefore, children are often sent to schools in the hope of obtaining an honorable job in the future. Parents have a certain image about what jobs they want their children to have. So, I still remember the eternal question about what we want to be in the future. Our answers seemed innocent, but in fact, they were not because they were an expression of what the family dreamed of, what the father or mother considered true and how they hoped for

us to achieve an eminent position in society.

I remember my first days in school before the age of six, and according to the Moroccan educational system, education at this stage is optional. Therefore, the Mo-

from age 4 to 6 that I mastered the Arabic and French letters in record time, and I also discovered the basic principles of reading and mathematics. The curricula were traditional and focused on indoctrination and memorization. This was the standard that every student had to meet be considered superior. Because my memory was strong, I was one of the distinguished ones.

However, I considered every study session a prison in which I was prohibited from any movement outside the rhythm of what the professor accepted. Therefore, the happiest mo-

ments of my life were when the class ended and I"let my feet into the wind," as we say in Arabic. I felt completely free and started running, and I thought to myself that I was the fastest being on earth.

roccan Ministry of Education does not supervise institutions that receive students at this early age. However, this does not mean that preschool education is not not as serious as it should be. Rather, it is perhaps more careful than regular education after the age of six since families and associations supervise the quality of the preschool education. The more rigorous the teaching is, the greater the satisfaction of families and the more profit and fame the center achieves. I remember that

Two years passed quickly and I was then ready to start my formal education in public school at age 6. The school was part of my city and one of the distinguished buildings we could not imagine the neighborhood without. Nevertheless, it was a strange and incomprehensible space shrouded in a lot of mystery because it was surrounded by high walls and had a strict guard at the door who only allowed entry to students. I would not have entered had it not been for the

help of my mother, who accompanied me on the first day of school. She registered me with the administration, and she introduced me to my classroom and to my new teacher, whose features I still remember very well.

She was a nice teacher, and I thought of her as the author of *Carrying the Weight of a Nation: The Story of a Guatemalan Boy* thought of his teacher, who really helped him. "Life

then decided to throw me a bone (one of the very few) in the form of my fourth-grade teacher, Mrs. Judy. For the first time in my four years of schooling, someone made the effort to help me out rather than let me crawl along." My teacher greeted me with a smiling face and tried to relieve the tension

that seemed



to attach me to my mother as if I was afraid of leaving her. It was my first day of education, the basic formal education supervised by the Moroccan Ministry of Education, which takes six years before passing a specific exam and moving to another educational level. This stage of study left an impact on my personality. Just as it gave me multiple skills, it also implanted in me behaviors, ideas, and habits that I still benefit from while I still suffer from others even now.

The first year was discovering and getting to know the surroundings. I did not find much difficulty in academic achievement because I was repeating what I had learned previously. Our classmates were progressing at different speeds. The teacher was trying to help those who were behind academically so they could catch up with the others, and that left me extra time. I actually cared about other skills, even if they were more hooliganism, for developing my

social and communication skills. I am one of the people who believe that playing and making mischief are sometimes important learning experiences. Therefore, I am currently keen to give my children the largest space to play and mess around, which is harmless. Just as I owe the school a lot on the academic level, I also owe a lot to the school environment and the free hours outside as well. A specific educational curriculum cannot give a person

the skills to deal with all people, problems, and the environment. As it is said, "swimming is not learned on paper."

The first and second years passed quickly, as they were completely similar in terms of form, with a slight difference in terms of content. It should be noted that the main change that occurred in the third year was the addition of the French language, and this is the differ-



ence between public education and private education. The French language in private education begins in the first year, while French is not introduced in public education until the third year.

In general, the linguistic issue in Morocco raises a sharp societal and academic debate in which all available cultural and ideological weapons are used because Moroccans do not forget that the French language is the language of the former colonizer and that it is an incomprehensibly imposed language in administrative affairs and most official documents. However, the country's constitution does not consider it as an official language. The two official languages in Morocco are Arabic and Amazigh, the language of the first inhabitants of Morocco, but the reality of the situation says the opposite. It is a reality that many segments of society struggle to change.

In general, the problem of the language of teaching and the teaching of languages was among the ideas that opened our minds to it since childhood, only we used to express it at our level at the time and we interacted with it not out of deep awareness of the problem, but out of escape from additional duties, of course,

or out of justification for some low points as a result of laziness in academic achievement. But when we grew up and began to understand the situation, we realized that we were facing a real problem that required a solution for a better future for the coming generations.

The experiences of those first years of study are embedded in my memory, some of them sad and disturbing, but most fun and beautiful, like the beauty of innocent childhood. The experience and lessons learned remain fertile material upon which the future can be built.

Pope Diant Hanger



Materials:

Plant pot

Acrylic paint (any color you like)

Jute rope

Screw hook (or other piece of hardware for attaching to ceiling/wall)

Scotch tape

Potting soil and plant

Instructions:

First paint your planter pot with whatever color you choose.


Grab the rope and cut 8 long pieces to make the hanger. Make sure to account for the extra rope needed to make the knots and the hanging loop on top.

Then tie all 8 strands of rope together leaving a tail that will be hanging at the bottom.


Turn your pot upside down, place the knot at the center, and divide the rope into groups of 2 strands.

Now, right past the edge of the pot, tie a knot for each of those groups of 2.

Tape the rope (divided evenly) under the pot to help with the next steps.



Get rid of any slack, and then tape these sets of rope to the pot.



The number of knots you will have will depend on the size of your planter.

Finally, grab all the remaining rope from the 4 groups of rope and tie a

knot at the end of it.

The length of it will depend on how high or low you would like the planter to hang.

You can now hang the planter wherever you like

and see more greenery in your house.
