Long and Tiring Journey

I struggled a lot when I came to the USA from Afghanistan during the Afghanistan evacuation. I applied for an SIV in 2009. After a lengthy procedure finally, I got my visa approval at the end of 2019, and I came to the USA on March 2020. A year later, I returned to my home country, Afghanistan, to visit my mother and other family members. We had a great time with our family, but suddenly the Taliban took over all of Afghanistan, and there we could not succeed because of the rush. I tried online to make our flight date earlier, and I made it on Aug 15, 2021, by paying \$200 extra, and my brother had it on Aug 16, 2021. We started to pack our clothes, and on Aug 15, 2021, I asked one of my friends to bring his car to drop us at the Kabul airport. We got in his car to start driving towards the Kabul airport, but when we came to the city, I saw everyone was trying to go to the Kabul

was no flight anywhere. We thought we wouldn't be able to go back to the USA anymore. I would like to share the obstacles I faced when I was stuck in Afghanistan for about a month because of the



airport, so traffic got jammed. People were on the roads. Finally, we got to Kabul airport with many difficulties. **Evervone had** fled from the airport, and everyone was saying the Afghanistan government was going to collapse. American soldiers took

Taliban and how I reached the USA.

When I was in Afghanistan, the Taliban started taking districts of Afghanistan. We were worried about our flight to the USA. Because we had not chosen the return flight flexibly, my oldest brother and I went to the Emirates Airline office in the Wazir Mohamad Akber Khan, Kabul, so we could make our flight date earlier, but when we got there, I saw a crowd of people who were trying to do the same, so the Emirates airline office was asking \$2000 per person. Unfortunately, control of the Kabul airport and canceled all flights. We went back home. On that night, the Taliban took over Afghanistan.

The next morning I went to the Kabul airport. I saw the Taliban at the airport gate. When I got to the ramp, the USA soldiers and about 100,000 people were there. They were trying to escape from the Taliban. Because of the US soldiers, the Taliban were not allowed to get to the ramp. While I was getting to the ramp, one of the Taliban was trying to get to the ramp, and the US army and Taliban



started shooting. I hid behind the tire of the airplane. The bullet hit two women and one man. The woman was wounded, and the US soldiers took her, but the other two died. When I described everything to my family, my mother did not allow me to go to the airport again.

A few hours later, we were informed through the news that the United States of America was evacuating its citizens from Afghanistan. We filled out the form on the US Embassy site and got a response. They asked us to come to the airport through one of the gates at 4:00 PM. Unfortunately, when we got to that gate, there were about 100,000 people at that gate, and the Taliban were hitting everyone with cables and insulting them. Many families lost their children. We returned home fearing to lose of our family members and children. After going to the airport gates sev-

eral times, we could not get into the airport. Finally, one evening a friend of mine said the Taliban only allows those who have a green card or a US passport to pass through one of the airport gates. We were afraid to go to the Taliban, but we had no choice. We went to that gate; the Taliban came close to me and wanted to hit me with a cable in his hand, so I called out,

"We have USA green cards." I gave it to them, and later they allowed us to enter the airport. After completing the military procedure and a long journey in the military planes, I arrived at a camp in Qatar. Then we flew to Washington. Most of the time, my friends and family members were telling me I would not be able to go back to my home in the USA, but I never gave up and reached my goal.

I learned a lot from that long journey. You can overcome any kind of obstacle if you don't give up. On that journey, I saw dead bodies, people being beaten with cables, bullets being shot at civilians, families being insulted, and children being lost. I think if you want to reach your goal, the whole universe helps you reach your goal. Never give up. Do what you believe you deserve. Every castle has a way to its top, and God gives everyone a chance to improve their life.

addition, there are some young and famous photographers such as Alex Stemlewski, Aidan Rowley, and Martin Wyall. Fame could be achieved through photography.






Al-Qarawiyyin University: The First and Oldest University in the World

Al-Qarawiyyin University is located in the city of Fez, central Morocco, on the banks of the famous Sebou River in Morocco. According to UNESCO and the Guinness Book of Records, Al-Qarawiyyin is the oldest university in the world, as it was established in 859 AD by Mrs. Fatima Al-Fihri, and it has become a scientific and spiritual center in the Islamic world and the rest of the world. Students have visited from all over the world to receive courses in various scientific disciplines such as medicine, arithmetic, astronomy, geography, history, linguistics, religion, and other scientific fields. The teaching method was based on scientific chairs, where a chair is allocated for each art or science, a field specialist sits on it, and the students gather around it in a circle. This distinctive method of educational attainment was a remarkable innovation for this university. Not







only that, but the University of Al-Qarawiyyin was the first to invent scientific degrees.

In 1963, the University of Al-Qarawiyyin was integrated into the system of public universities in Morocco. This institution continues to provide scientific and educational services to this day. Still, it offers lessons in Arabic language sciences, Islamic sciences, philosophy and theology, as well as studies in the English and French languages, in the inherited traditional way, where students sit on the floor in circles around the chair of the professor who gives his lecture.

The University of Al-Qarawiyyin, in addition to many of the ancient schools in the city of Fez, is also considered one of the most important tourist attractions, due to its historical value and unique architecture, it reflects one of the brightest eras of the Moroccan state in that era and the eras that followed.

Many scholars and thinkers worldwide have graduated from the university, and the university's scientific and cultural activity has lasted for nearly 1,000 years. One of the most important graduates from this university was Sylvester II, who held the position of Pope in the period 999-1003 AD. Likewise, Moses bin Maimonides, the Jewish physician and philosopher, spent several years there, during which time he taught at Al-Qarawiyyin University. Among the scholars who resided in Fez and taught at its universities was Ibn Khaldun, the historian and founder of sociology. The University of Al-Qarawiyyin issued the first medical certificate in the world at the beginning of the 13th century, to the Moroccan doctor Abdullah bin Saleh Al-Ketami, in the presence of a scientific committee and the judge of the city of Fez in the year 1207 AD. The university library keeps a copy of this certificate for visitors to see in the area of the valuable manuscript.

Al-Qarawiyyin University was, and still is,



one of the three most important scientific and religious centers in the Islamic world: Al-Azhar Mosque in Egypt and Al-Zaytouna Mosque in Tunisia.



atomic bomb: his research interests as a young man and professor, his directing of the project that created the first two nuclear bombs (the Manhattan Project, during World War II), and his subsequent interrogation by the U.S. government in a 1954 security hearing.

In addition to being educational and engaging, the film is stunning from an audio and

visual standpoint. The soundtrack, composed by Ludwig Göransson, is well worth hearing in surround sound, the music crackling in places with intense electric suspense and bending eerily in others with visceral violin glissandos. Visually, fire is pictured as a massive force of nature whose power is being unlocked and unleashed in a way thitherto unimaginable.

The film, directed by Christopher Nolan (Interstellar, The Dark Knight, Inception, Dunkirk, etc.), is based on the 2005 biography American Prometheus, by Kai Bird, which likens

Oppenheimer to Prometheus, the Greek god of fire. In Greek mythology, Prometheus disobeys Zeus, the king of the gods, by stealing fire and giving it to human beings, for which crime Zeus punishes him by condemning Prometheus to eternal torment. Oppenheimer, too, was forced to endure torment following the invention of the atomic bomb, when his life conduct, politics, and associations were investigated—at great length. Even the viewer feels exhausted by the investigation, without which the film would not have extended to three full hours.

But there is much to reward the viewer in this three-hour cinematic experience, even from a language standpoint. It just so happens that Oppenheimer's genius extended to the learning of languages. We learn that, in only three weeks' time, he acquired enough fluency in Danish to give a lecture on particle physics in Danish.



Also, he knew German well enough to read Karl Marx's tome *Das Kapital* in the original. Lastly, the film shows him reading the Indian scripture *The Bhagavad Gita* in the original Sanskrit. He translates a sentence of Krishna's, ominously profound: "Now I am become Death, the destroyer of worlds."

Oppenheimer was also, in his spare time, an avid reader of poetry. Indeed, his choice of names for the testing site of the atomic bomb relates to the fact that he was reading John Donne's Holy Sonnets at the time. It was the fourteenth holy sonnet, "Batter my heart, threeperson'd God" (1633), that led Oppenheimer to choose

the name of "Trinity." On August 4, 1985, following the 40th anniversary of the test blast at the Trinity site, a letter to the editor appeared in the *New York Times* which explained that Donne's "verse on the life-renewing power of the Trinity converged with Dr. Oppenheimer's growing conviction that the first test of the implosion bomb would unleash a force destined ultimately to free humanity from the destructive power of nationalism and war."



This idealistic perspective of Oppenheimer's was, however, short-lived. fully graduated. She is now working in her field, which has been traditionally male-dominated in Afghanistan. Therefore, she is a voice for women in Afghanistan. There is no doubt that we need more women like her. I chose to interview her in order to encourage and motivate young women to follow her as a role model and to reach their goals. there are not more women working in STEM. It was even harder in Afghanistan. As a woman who studied and worked in this field, I faced discrimination, and I was treated unkindly by male colleagues. I was told many times by multiple male colleagues that IT (Information Technology) was not suitable for me as a woman; instead, they suggested I become a teacher where I would not have to deal with men. Some of the views reflected those of the Taliban

Can you tell us about your journey as an activist from Afghanistan? What has motivated you in this field?

I am Nazia Nasrat, a Fulbright Scholar currently living in North California. I earned my bachelor's in computer science from Kabul University in 2012. In 2018 I started my master's in information technology in the United States though the Fulbright Program. I was one of the



and the most conservative segments of Afghan society. There were times that I felt isolated and very vulnerable with nowhere to find protection, but I have never wanted to give up.

Since I had a father who believed in me and encouraged me to overcome the obstacles in our culture, I learned to believe in myself as a woman and to pursue my education and career even if it meant leaving Afghanistan. Because of this, I believed that I could be as successful as any man in STEM. That's why I am here now!

What are your specific

early women pioneers to study computer science in Afghanistan and progressed to become one of the rare female leaders in STEM. I worked for USAIDrelated international organizations for several years in Kabul, and currently I am working for Disney Streaming Services as a Senior Data Engineer.

What are the biggest challenges you have faced as a woman in Afghanistan while working towards these goals? And what has helped you to go forward?

Women in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Math) jobs are far more likely than their male counterparts to cite discrimination in hiring and promotions, and this is a major reason why

concerns for women in Afghanistan?

I am deeply concerned about the current situation in Afghanistan. Afghanistan has never been a safe place for women, but now the Taliban excludes women from all sectors of society under the cover of religion. The Taliban, as a conservative and tribal force, has been waging socioeconomic warfare against women. The Taliban denies women education, they have fired women from all public and private jobs, and recently the Taliban-led government has banned hundreds of beauty salons run by women who are the sole breadwinners for their families. I don't think the situation for all the people of Afghanistan, especially women, could get any



worse than this. Women have suffered the most from the Taliban takeover of Afghanistan.

What strategies or initiatives have you implemented to empower women in Afghanistan and promote gender equality?

I personally haven't implemented any program for women in Afghanistan, but I actively took part in projects implemented by the USAID-funded

international organizations for Afghanistan women's capacity building and their empowerment. Since September 2020, I have been volunteering with <u>World</u> <u>Relief--Sacramento</u>, assisting the organization with their literacy program for Afghanistan women in California and helping new immigrants with translation.

What kind of support, both locally and globally, do you believe is essential for the success of women in Afghanistan who are activists, education program leaders, and business leaders?

Unfortunately, no significant attention has been paid to the real women activ-

ists in Afghanistan by the international community. Active women who raised their voice to get their basic rights are being arrested and tortured by the Taliban. Since there is plenty of evidence to confirm this, the international community was content with just releasing a statement to condemn it and nothing else. The very first thing women in Afghanistan need in this situation is the world's support and attention so that their voices are heard. I think the world should stand against the Taliban and keep them accountable.

While I am in support of women's education and want all girls in Afghanistan to go to school and university, I am even more concerned that the curriculum used in schools and other educational institutions should not be controlled by the Taliban. The Taliban are changing the school textbooks to promote jihad and are converting schools to madrasas.



By changing the curriculum, they are promoting a culture of violence and deceit. If it continues this way, we should get ready for a new generation of jihadists.

The first step is awareness. The world should be made aware of what the women in Afghanistan are going through. It's so sad that the world talks about the courageous women of Iran but keeps quiet on the suffering of women in Afghanistan.

How has the current political transition in Afghanistan affected your work, and what is your future considering these changes? I have had to move away from all my family members and forge

a new life for myself in a new country to be free. I can never return to my home country while the Taliban are in control. I'm working to rescue at least my sisters from the terrible conditions for women in Afghanistan.

Can you share a specific success story of yours and how it has impacted the lives of women in Afghanistan? In 2018, I received the most prestigious Fulbright Scholarship funded by the U.S. State Department to pursue my master's in the United States. That was a life-changing opportunity and proof that hard work pays off. During my studies in Indiana and after I graduated, I assisted many other women who were preparing to apply for the program. Fortunately, two of them got accepted and another young lady got the <u>Chevening Scholarship</u>. I've always wanted to help women and those who plan to pursue further education by sharing my experiences and knowledge.

What are your hobbies, and can you tell us about your favorite childhood experience?

I like going to the gym and enjoy traveling and exploring new places. I have liked reading books and Persian literature since childhood. When I was in primary school in Tajikistan, I used to write poems and was always encouraged by my teachers. My late father, who was my biggest supporter, loved my writings.

What is your specific message for Afghanistan women who are inside Afghanistan and who are immigrants in different countries?

For the fearless and resilient women of Afghanistan who have stood up so bravely, demanding their rights, I just want to say that you are full of courage. You are full of strength. I believe that the defeat of the Taliban will be in your hands and the future of Afghanistan belongs to you!

My message is specifically to those Afghanistan women who are settled in the U.S. or other countries. Please give a helping hand to those women who have recently become immigrants and have to start everything over. Help them learn the new language, become independent, and start a new life. We all know how hard it is to start over in a totally different country. Let's help them find their way and become financially independent. In the meantime, don't forget those left behind in Afghanistan. We have to try to help them in any possible way.

DIX Hanging Gutter Planter



Materials:

1 – 10 ft. White Traditional Vinyl Gutter

3 Sets – White End Caps. (6 total)

20' – 1/4 in. White Braided Nylon and Polyester Rope

1 pack – 1/4 in. x 2 in. Zinc-Plated Rope S-Hook 2 – 3 3/4 in. Steel Screw-In Plant Hook

Optional: Exterior Spray Paint







Instructions:

Cut the 10 ft. vinyl gutter into 3 36" sections. Then turn the gutters upside down and mark drill points 4" in from the side, and 1/2" down from



the top lip on all four corners of the three gutter sections.

Drill holes using a 3/8" drill bit.

Next, pop the K-Style End Caps onto the ends of the three gutter sections.

Next, thread the rope up one side of the gutters, then loop it at the top and then thread it back down the other side. Measure 12" of rope in between each gutter and knot the rope under each gutter to hold it in place.

Finally, to hang the gutters, secure the plant hooks into the beam of your patio or anywhere you would like. Have fun creating and designing your new hanging planter.
