

While I was studying in high school, I did a lot of writing assignments on biology. I always got them back from the teacher with a low grade but without any correction or underlining, and we were not allowed to dispute our grades. It made biology my least favorite subject. I think schools and colleges should refuse the existing grading system.

The first disadvantage of the grading system is a large pressure on students' mental health. Before some important assignments, children worry a lot and feel anxiety. And this state often doesn't allow them to get high grades. It is a never-ending cycle. Also, grades can cause a bad relationship between kids and parents. Instead of asking, "What did you learn today?" or "Did you have fun? How was your day?" parents pay attention to grades. Sometimes children feel fear after getting a low grade. Also, comparing their own grades with others can lower their self-esteem and discourage them from studying.

The second reason why the grading system should be revised is its inability to reflect students' knowledge correctly. Checking students' essays, the teacher can't be sure that it is really their own work. On the other hand, students also can't assess themselves correctly with grades. Instead of just grades, it would be great for students to get individual feedback from the teacher, pointing out what part of material should be paid attention to. These comments have to help in future classes and not just assess students' past performance.

However, there are situations when grades are necessary. For example, universities can't accept everyone who has applied. So, they have entrance exams for their future students. Of course, these exams can also be stressful for students. In my country, I was supposed to have graduation exams. Then I had to take exams at all the universities where I wanted to apply. The difference between school and university exams was huge! But later, there was only one unified

state exam. School students could choose a few needed subjects and prepare for almost one year for that exam. The results of that exam could be accepted by any university in my country. I think it is a less stressful way to get the most important grades that could influence your future.

To wrap up, I'd say that the existing grading system needs to be revoked. Grades often become a reason of students' stress and anxiety. They also can lead to bad relationships in the family. In addition, grades don't give a real assessment of students' knowledge. But we still have situations when our level of knowledge needs to be assessed. For those situations, there are supposed to be favorable and calm conditions to prepare for important exams. So, I think schools and colleges shouldn't continue to use grades.


# My Most Useful Things



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






# **Book Review:** The Bamboo Stalk

Note: This is a review of the Arabic version of the novel, not the English version; therefore, the names of the characters and places are from my personal translation.

The novel *The Bamboo Stalk* is a distinctive literary work written by Kuwaiti novelist Saud Al-Sanousi. It was first published in 2012 and won the International Prize for Arabic Fiction (Booker Prize) in 2013.



Saud Al-Sanousi's book delves into identity, belonging, cultural diversity, and social conflicts. This novel is one of the few significant literary works that shed light on the complexities of mixed identities in Arab society, especially in the Arab Gulf countries, where many cultures and ethnicities coexist. This part of the world is considered one of the most attractive regions for foreign workers because it offers economic stability. But this stability is not without religious, cultural, ethnic, and political challenges.

The novel presents Issa's challenges in adapting to the new culture and searching for his place in society.

One of the most prominent topics in the novel is the theme of identity and belonging in a multicultural context. This is depicted through Issa, who struggles to define his identity in a volatile world between Kuwait and the Philippines. 

inevitable and in most cases unavoidable simply because it's human nature. This reality definitely applies to Al's current development. These new developments bring us closer to a technology capable of doing jobs that have always been thought of as human work. Tasks like creative writing, art, health care, finance, and autonomous driving are some of the many things Al is capable of doing. This powerful tool could help thousands of people in ways that have not even been thought of. However, like any new technology, AI is a double-edged sword. If not properly used or developed, AI could severely damage society. This is why regulations for AI should be put in place. If none are enacted, AI could negatively impact education, compromise online security, and spread misinformation.

One of the main concerns with Al is its influence on education. Over the decades schools have used a variety of techniques to deter cheating, and at the time they were really effective. Subjects that rely heavily on creativity were also fairly resilient to common cheating methods. However, with the introduction of Al tools,

cheating has become an ever-growing problem. These AI tools are effective because they produce written text that is almost indistinguishable from human writing. Indeed, any assignment requiring written material can easily be completed using AI tools. While AI plagiarism detection tools do exist for such applications, they are highly unreliable and may cause more harm than good. According to a research paper from computer science professor Soheil Feizi, "For a sufficiently advanced language model seeking to imitate human text, even the bestpossible detector may only perform marginally better than a random classifier" (Feizi 1). In other words, using plagiarism detectors is hardly better than deciding randomly if a text is plagiarized. Furthermore, students have also been found to use AI tools for research purposes, which can result in very misleading research. For proper research, students need to know the sources and relevance of the information. This is to say, research is an active and not a passive process as AI tools present it. AI bias, which will be discussed in depth later in this text, has also been found in AI tools which could result in biased research. All of these problems combine to create an unproductive and meaningless learning experience for students. According to educationnext.org, "Aside from the ethical issues involved in such cheating, students who use AI to do their work for them may not be learning the content and skills they need" (educationnext. org). This is why regulations and standards need to be put in place for these AI tools to ensure the stability of the education system.

Another fundamental concern with Al is its potential use in malicious activities and information alteration. It shouldn't be a surprise to see Al tools being used in scam operations and blackmail. At its core, Al is a tool that's meant to emulate humans. In other words, Al is a very effective tool for impersonation and manipulation. Tools such as voice emulators



and image deep fakes are some of the many tools used by scammers. According to the Federal Trade Commission, "Al products could be used by malicious actors to increase the scale or sophistication of existing scams" (Federal Trade Commission per.2). On a technical level, Al is also an effective tool for system hacking. Al's ability to emulate humans makes it a great tool for bypassing online security measures. As Cyber Seniors point out, "Al can create malware that cians or other beneficiaries to influence public opinion. However, there is a much more fundamental issue with the AI system itself. Some AI models were shown to output biased information in accordance with the information it was given. Instead of detecting bias, these AI systems amplify any bias they find in their input data and present it as truth. According to the National Library of Medicine, "Some artificial intelligence (AI) systems can display algorithmic bias, i.e. they may

adapts its behavior to bypass traditional security measures, evading detection systems" (Cyber Seniors per.3). These qualities clearly justify why Al should be a regulated system to ensure



produce outputs that unfairly discriminate against people based on their social identity" (National Library of Medicine per.1). This can be extremely dangerous, especially when AI becomes a more widely used tool around the world. For ex-

online security.

On a much larger scale, AI tools could also be used by malicious actors to spread misinformation. This is another widely used application of AI in the media that can have extremely detrimental effects. According to Homeland Security "deep fakes and synthetic media do not need to be particularly advanced or believable in order to be effective in spreading mis/disinformation" (Homeland Security per.5). In other words, as AI tools become more sophisticated, the spread of misinformation will become an even larger problem. If allowed to continue, these tools could easily be used by corrupt politiample, if AI becomes a tool used by employers to pick out promising candidates, the AI system will likely make decisions that are in favor of certain social groups. These issues highlight the importance of AI regulations. If no regulations are put in place, social disparity will become a big issue that could later develop into civil conflicts.

Some might argue that current online regulations sufficiently ensure public security, and that there is truly nothing special about the issues presented by AI. They might also see AI as just like any new piece of software that is overhyped. This perspective undermines the significance of AI to the human condition. AI is special in that it is able to almost perfectly emu-



late human intelligence, which carries a lot of unique issues, as discussed earlier. Some might also argue that the pinnacle of the technology revolution is the creation of human-level artificial intelligence. While this is debatable, no one can argue against the impact AI could have on society. One can name any field, and somehow AI could be involved. Therefore, saying that AI is hype or not special does not take into mind the bigger picture of AI's involvement in society.

Despite being in its early stages, AI has already caught the world's attention. This technology could change everything about society. But like any technology, it carries a lot of issues and risks that require strict regulations. If none are enacted, AI could compromise the quality of student's education, put everyone at risk of online fraud and hacking, and spread misinformation that could destabilize society. It is very possible that new unforeseen issues will develop, for AI touches on every aspect of society. However, with all of that in mind, it is still important to see the potential of AI in helping push humanity forward. It is good to have a rational mindset when dealing with new technology, but one must not fall for his own bias.



## ARC Student, Mother, and Dari Poem Declaimer: Interview with Shaqaeeq Qaderi

Sayed Edres Sadiqi: Salam, Mrs. Shaqaeeq Qaderi. First of all, thank you for giving *The Parrot* the opportunity to have an interview with you. Please introduce yourself and tell us about how you started your educational journey at American River College?

**Shaqaeeq Qaderi:** I am Shaqaeeq Qaderi, a student at American River College. I have lived for about two years in the United States of America. I wasn't able to start my education as soon as I got here because I was told that I needed to live one year to become a California resident first and then I could start my education. So, I missed one year of my education because of some paperwork preparation.

Sayed Edres Sadiqi: What is your major and what semester are you in right now? Also, did you face any challenges when you were enrolling yourself in American River College. If you did, how did you overcome the challenges? Shagaeeg Qaderi: This is my second semester and I'd love to be a nurse in future, but as of now, mostly I am taking ESL classes to get ready, and then I will take my major classes in future semesters. It is obvious that enrollment in American colleges is so different from enrollment in Afghanistan. I think this is also normal when you enter a new environment or a new system; you will face some challenges. I also experienced that when I decided to start my education at American River College. The enrollment process was totally new for me and I had no idea where to start and how to complete the process. However, thankfully there are so many Afghan students who are working as student helpers in different departments, who went through the enrollment procedures before and know everything from A-Z. They were the best resources for me that helped me so much to get through the enrolment problems. The first person I had the honor to get introduced to at ARC was Prisa Jan, who helped me so much in the enrollment process and played a mentor role for me. I am so thankful for her. I noticed that student helpers who can speak languages such as Russian, Ukrainian, Arabic, Dari, Farsi, Pashto, Urdu, Hindi, etc., are also available in different departments. They can help new students from other countries.

Sayed Edres Sadiqi: Some of the newly arrived immigrants have strong enthusiasm to start their education here in the United States but, due to unfamiliarity with the new educational system, enrollment procedures, and available resources, can't start their education or enroll at all. So, what do you want to tell those who have this kind of feeling?


Shaqaeeq Qaderi: Usually, it is so normal to tackle



challenges when you enter a new system, especially when we are talking about the educational system in America for immigrant students, but based on my personal experience, I would recommend immigrant students to connect with positive-minded people who encourage you towards your life goals and to avoid the negative minded-people who can have a negative impact on yourself. Then, search for the people who went through the same process or we (immigrants) can't do it. They reason this way because their English is not good or they don't know anything about the education system in the United States. How was your first-year experience at ARC? # Sayed Edres Sadiqi: What particular resources were helpful for you in your first semester?

Thankfully, I knew some ARC students that I was able to contact and get help from. The second resource that helped me was the Afghan student helpers working in different ARC departments. The third resource that was pretty helpful was the professors in the ESL Department. The ESL professors are doing their best to speak in a way that a second language speaker can understand and are available to help you with your lessons whenever you need help.

Sayed Edres Sadiqi: Immigrant students have different perspectives regarding higher education in the United States. Some may think that higher education in the United States is so difficult and everyone else can do it too.

#### Sayed Edres Sadiqi: So, your point is that with good life planning, even if new immigrants have lots of other responsibilities, they can pursue their higher education, right?

**Shaqaeeq Qaderi:** Yes, I was considering my life responsibilities and answered the questions. I am a mother who has all the responsibility of a housewife. Plus, I am a student and a declaimer who actively attends many cultural events. So, I have good planning and I think I'm doing all of my responsibilities very well. Hence, I believe other immigrants with good planning can continue their education alongside the other responsibilities they may have.

Sayed Edres Sadiqi: How do you spend your free time if you have any, with all the responsibilities you have?

Shaqaeeq Qaderi: In my free time usually, I go to



the Sacramento Public Library and study there. I also exercise sometimes, and moreover, I love to spend my free time with my family. Besides all I mentioned above, one thing that I love doing in my free time is declaiming Dari poems.

#### Sayed Edres Sadiqi: Wow, that is fantastic. So, you are a declaimer? Can you tell us more about it and share with us how you began declaiming Dari poems as your hobby?

Shagaeeg Qaderi: When I was living in Afghanistan, I loved declaiming Dari poems in my school or on any occasion, but when I moved to the United States of America, my interest and passion in declaiming Dari poems got stronger and stronger day by day. In Afghanistan, my teachers at school and my classmates and friends were always encouraging me to declaim Dari poems. However, when I moved to Sacramento, California, I attended an Afghan culture night where I declaimed my first poem in the United States, and the Dari poem was from Kazim Kazimi. So many people from the Afghan community, people I never knew before, encouraged me a lot, and even my parents noticed that lots of people liked my declaiming, so they encouraged me to continue this path.

Sayed Edres Sadiqi: How did you first discover your talent in declaiming Dari poems? Shaqaeeq Qaderi: I was born in a belletristic family. My father is a poet. He writes Dari poems, and my brother is a declaimer too. Growing up I saw my brother declaiming Dari poems, and that caused me to start declaiming Dari poems and recording my voice and listening to it. Initially I shared my recording with my brother and he liked it so much and encouraged me a lot. Gradually I got better and better and started to declaim at school and in gatherings.

#### Sayed Edres Sadiqi: If there is anything that we did not cover in our interview so far and you want to share with ARC students especially immigrant students, please share?

**Shaqaeeq Qaderi:** I want to say, "No pain, no gain." If you want to achieve something in your life, you have to work for it. Don't lose hope. Put as much effort as you can to make your dreams come true. There is no doubt that you will face challenges, but I can assure you that you will be able to overcome all the challenges if you have solid determination to work for your goals.

**Shaqaeeq Qaderi:** It was a pleasure to have an interview with you. Thank you very much.






Logan Shoals Vista Point, Lake Tahoe NV

## Words of a Feather Posessive Nouns

THE PARROT



#### **Definition:**

Possessive nouns show ownership. Possessive comes from the same root as possession, something you own.

There are two types of Posessive Nouns:

#### **Singular Possessives**

Add 's to singular words to show possession.

#### Example:

dog's collar / sister's backpack / car's engine (dog + 's) (sister + 's) (car + 's)

If a singular word ends in s, it is still necessary to add 's.

#### Example:

Charles's sneakers / Bess's dress / bus's tires (Charles + 's) (Bess + 's) (bus + 's)

#### **Plural Possessives**

If you have added an s to make a word plural (for example, *cat=cats*), adding 's will sound ridiculous (*cats*'s). In that case, add only the apostrophe to the end of the word.

#### Example:

dogs' collars / sisters' backpacks (dogs + ') (sisters + ')

Just like singular possessives, plural possessives that don't end in s add 's.

#### Example:

Children's homework (Children + 's) Fish's bowls (Fish + 's) Octopi's tentacles (Octopi + 's)

that she is advocating and fighting for women's rights with the current regime. Although she is not allowed to work, she is trying her best to advocate for humanity and human rights inside Afghanistan. Therefore, she is a voice of hope for the women in Afghanistan. There is no doubt that we need more women like her. I chose to interview her to encourage and motivate the young women to follow her as a role model and reach their goals.

#### Asila: Can you tell us about your journey as an activist in Afghanistan? What motivated you? *Malalai:* I am Malalai Alavi from Herat, Afghanistan.

For more than 15 years, I have been working for human rights; specifically, I am a women's advocate and am fighting to bring changes in women's rights in Afghanistan law. Despite the serious threats I've faced, I wanted to stay in Afghanistan with women of my homeland. While under severe se-



political, social, cultural, and economic scenes, and the loss of all the achievements made over the past two decades due to international pressure and the activism of Afghan women are not only concerning but also disastrous. In terms of economic selfsufficiency, women in Afghanistan are

curity threats, I have raised my voice for justice for two consecutive years through participation in civil protests, social media, and other media. I have spoken out against explicit human rights violations and harsh restrictions imposed on women in the face of adversity. Fighting in the heart of enemy territory is challenging, and Afghan women protesters experience it every day.

Asila: What are the biggest challenges you have faced as a woman in Afghanistan while pursuing your goals? And what made you go forward? *Malalai:* Being a woman in Afghanistan poses various challenges, including religious, economic, cultural, and social challenges. Undesirable traditions and beliefs prevalent in society directly impact now living in poverty. The collapse of the economy has led to a society where women have no rights. Women's political participation has dropped to zero, and most young girls are facing mental health crises. Overall, women are experiencing a regression reminiscent of the dark days of the 1990s.

#### Asila: What initiatives have you implemented to empower women in Afghanistan and promote gender equality?

**Malalai:** When I served as an advisor in the executive branch and High Council for National Reconciliation and as the deputy of the provincial council in Herat, I launched the justice for women movement in 2016. Through an annual plan focused on gender issues, I implemented various programs and organized seminars for government staff.

#### Asila: What kind of support, both locally and globally, do you believe is essential for the success of women activists, education programs, and business leaders in Afghanistan?

THE PARROT

**Malalai:** Due to severe educational and occupational limitations in Afghanistan, it is necessary to continue non-official and online capacity-building programs for women through supporting partners. Creating opportunities for small and medium-sized businesses through capital and loans is essential. Internationally, more laws and protection programs for Afghan women need to be established.

#### Asila: How has the current political transition in Afghanistan affected your work, and what is your future considering these changes?

Malalai: First of all, we should not call it a "political transition." It should be called the usurpation of power through covert deals. This process has had very negative effects on the work and economy of all Afghan citizens. We need a peace deal structured so that women have a role in politics and society, as they did in the past. However, the regime they created itself poses the biggest threat to women. This regime believes in the spread of Islamic sanctity, and within these sanctities, according to religious fundamentalists, extremists, and clerics, women have no place. The influx of unwanted elements like the Taliban (and some countries support this group) contributes to the survival of the regime and the ambiguity of Afghanistan's fate. All of this is a cause for concern.

# Asila: What are your hobbies, and can you tell us about a favorite childhood experience?

**Malalai**: My childhood took place during a time when Afghanistan suffered from wars and the deprivation of the right to education under the first phase of the Taliban rule. Unfortunately, I have no good memories from my childhood. Currently, besides keeping up with daily news, I am engaged in reading books and occasionally participating in interviews or sessions with women.

Asila: What is your specific message for Afghanistan women who are inside Afghanistan and for Afghanistan women who are immigrants in different countries for their self-development and capacity-building or something else? Malalai: My message for Afghan women who are inside Afghanistan is to never surrender to oppressive rules. Do not accept defeat; continue the fight because no revolution succeeds without accepting risks and sacrifices for victory. Fight for your rights. For Afghan women abroad, empowerment is necessary for progress. Increase scientific and educational achievements in any possible way. Do not leave any human rights organizations untouched. Do not hesitate to make efforts for a change in the fate of women within your country and make the world focus more on Afghanistan.

# **DIY** House Number Plaque

THE PARROT



#### Materials:

- Wood slice
- Mason jar
- Hose clamp
- Screwdriver
- Small piece of wood
- Sandpaper
- Vinyl numbers
- Picture hook and nails
- Burlap
- Flowers



#### Tools:

- Screwdriver
- Drill (optional)

#### Instructions:

- 1. Decide on mason jar placement; screw the small piece of wood into the wood slice in this location. Use the drill.
- 2. Nail two thin nails into the slots of the hose clamp and into the piece of wood.



3. Use a hand screwdriver to tighten the clamp





around the mason jar until secure. Add a picture hook to the back of the wood slice for hanging.

- 4. Use some sandpaper to smooth out the area where you will place the vinyl numbers.
- 5. Peel off the numbers needed and stick them on the wood slice in the desired arrange-ment.
- 6. To finish, wrap a few artificial or real flowers in burlap and place them into the jar. Hang the plaque on your home outside, preferably in a covered area.

Rather, they were effective weapons for criticizing public policies, social conditions, governance systems, and prevailing culture.

At this level, there is a similarity between this type of Arabic poetry and the art of rap because the art of rap is essentially an act of

geography. This applies to the "poetry of contradiction" (also known as "poetic duel" or "antithesis poetry") in the Arab culture, on the one hand, and to the art of modern rap, on the other.

"Contradiction poetry" is one of the impor-

tant literary arts in Arabic literature. It is a type of poetry that appeared in the Umayyad era in particular (historically extending from 661 AD to 750 AD) and is characterized by a poetic duel between poets. Each poet praises himself and disparages the other in his poems while adhering to the meter and rhyme of the disparaged poem. Jarir and Al-Farazdaq are among the most famous poets of this art, and their duel poetry received great attention from scholars and researchers in Arabic literature. This type of poetry expresses literary competition and creativity through language and rhetorical



revolution against existing conditions. This art arose in the United States in the late sixties and early seventies as a form of cultural and political expression for minorities, especially in African American communities. It was used as a means of expressing the social and political issues faced by these communities. Dueling in the art of rap, also known as "battle rap," is

a form of poetic competition in which rappers confront each other in poetic battles involving rhythm and rhyme. Duels in the art of rap are a way to show poetic skill and creativity in rhythm and words.

Another technique that distinguishes the art of rap is the "freestyle," and it is considered the pinnacle of artistic skill. Competitors must confront each other directly without prior preparation, and the two competitors begin a poetic duel with the same rhyme and rhythm. The competition is often in the presence of a large audience and specialists in this art, and one artist is preferred over another. Therefore, this type of art requires a broad memory, quick wit, intelligence, and mastery of the art of speech.

This type of artistic competition has its roots in the ancient Arab poetic culture, as there was a famous gathering in the Arabian Peninsula before Islam called "Souk Okaz," which was an annual exhibition of poetry and literature. Poetry competition was an important part of the events, where poets competed to cal traditions. These traditions then developed over time and were influenced by other cultures in America, those related to jazz and blues. In the 1970s, in the African-American communities of cities such as New York, a modern form of rap began to take its current form as part of hip-hop culture.

In this context, some argue that rap is an acronym (RAP) that stands for "Rhythmic African Poetry." But the most popular opinion attributes "RAP" to the abbreviation for the phrase

recite their poems to the audience. These competitions allowed poets to demonstrate their poetic and artistic skills. The winning poems were often hung on the walls of the Kaaba (a sacred place for Muslims to which they pilgrimage every year for worship, and it was also sacred

to Arabs before Islam. It is currently located in the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia). These competitions are considered important cultural events in the history of Arabic literature.

This similarity between the poetry of contradiction, which belongs to the Arab poetic heritage, and the art of rap is what has led some researchers to say that the rap descends from the Arabic poetic duel and was transmitted from the Arabian Peninsula via commercial caravans over long periods to East Africa, where local rhythms were added that depend on drums. This was the most important change in this type of poetry, that is, the addition of rhythm. This culture was later transferred to America. However, the art of rap did not move directly from Africa to America in its modern form. When Africans were brought as slaves to the Americas, they carried with them their cultural and musi"Rhythm And Poetry," which is the most likely meaning, given the basic characteristics that characterize this art. This is the part about which there can be consensus. It should be noted, however, that this is considered a "backronym," meaning that the acronym actually is not the real

origin of the word but an explanation that became popular well after the term "rap" became common.

In conclusion, we find striking similarities in comparing rap music and the art of Arabic antithesis poetry. Both arts are characterized by poetic competition and creativity in the use of language. In antithetical poetry, poets compete for linguistic and rhetorical superiority, while in rap, the competition appears through rhythm and rhyme. Both express a societal culture and reflect its social or political issues. These similarities highlight the deep connection between artistic expression and the human need for selfexpression and identity no matter the culture.
