
board games are now moments that might last forever because they make them happy. And one of these moments can also be when they try new things.

Those Who Built the Real Ones

Every immigrant coming to any country is attentive to details; for example, its details of architecture, people's lives, and monuments. As the saying goes, "If you know the history, you know the future." I would like to tell you what I had to learn about our city of Sacramento. In fact, I'm going to talk about every famous and important personality in the city. I think we need to start with the founder of our city.

This is John A. Sutter, who is of Swiss origin, who once saw the banks of the American River and the Sacramento River and began to build the future city. The first that was built was a sawmill. Thanks to the sawmill, gold was discovered. This prompted a large influx of settlers. John A. Sutter built the fort and thus the solid foundation for the city. However, his son continued his father's work, and in 1848 he invited an engineer–topographer to build the city. And, he drew up the plan of the city, which included 31 streets from north to south and 26 streets from east to west. This is how the city of Sacramento was founded.

The next important personality is Hardin Bigelow. In 1850, this man became the first mayor of our city. He built the first dams in Sacramento and built the dams at his own expense. It is also worth saying that he was to rebuild Sacramento after a big fire. By the way, the city was rebuilt not of wood, but of steel, iron, and bricks. Hardin Bigelow became a significant personality for the city.

Another personality is the woman who gave Sacramento the best private art collec-

tion in the West. This is Margret Eleanor Rhodes. Her husband was an active opponent of slavery. This wedded pair had many tricks, but they had to do an incredible amount for the city. They collected a large collec-



tion in Germany. When they returned home, they set up a large gallery complex. Margret became a famous philanthropist and a significant community leader for Sacramento. Her credits include the construction of the Bell Conservatory, the orangery on the 9th and the 10th streets, and homes for women who needed these.

All of these people are integral parts of Sacramento's history. It was very interesting for me to learn the stories of these people.

How did I feel during my first public speaking in English?

Have you ever delivered a public speech in a foreign language? If so, how did it make you feel? I want to share a story that happened in 2023 at American River College in Sacramento. During the fall semester, I challenged myself to enroll in Communication 301. So that you understand, I have always been afraid of public speaking, although I have a higher legal education and I have had experience speaking in front of an audience in Russia. However, I

still had a fear of speaking, and here I had to speak in English. I was very confused by the fact that in my class all the students come from high school, and they speak quickly, using idioms or new words that I have never heard before. Then, I had to write a three to four-minute speech explaining how the author of the video uses ethos, pathos, and logos. I can explain what they are. Ethos is about trust and reliability; pathos involves appealing to the audience's emotions, and logos involves using facts and evidence to make a point. I have begun to learn new vocabulary. To be honest, it was not an easy task to accomplish. I had to

put in a lot of effort because the words were long and difficult to pronounce. For example, words that I would need to use for my assignment included: approximately, heartbreaking, incarceration, empathetic, persuasive, etc. Well, I learned these words by constantly saying them out loud.


The more I did this, the more I realized that I would not be able to pronounce them correctly. I was so overcome with fear and un-

derstanding that I would not be able to make this speech. I decided to talk to the professor and drop out of his course.

My next step was to have an honest conversation with my professor. The professor and I met online on Zoom. His name is Professor Adam. The professor is a young man of 32 years old. I told to the professor about my worries and that I wanted to drop out of his course, that I only understood 30 percent of my classmates. The professor listened to me and recommended that I try

to finish this class and that I could count on his help. After our speaking, I felt relief because I let him know about my fear of public speaking and the professor was incredibly understanding and supportive. This conversation gave me the confidence that I was not alone and that I had support.

After a conversation with the professor, I began to practice speaking a lot. The best method was to practice my speech in front of the mirror. For several days, I stood in front of the mirror and practiced my speech repeatedly.



It was hard for me, but thanks to consistent practice, my pronunciation improved, and my throat discomfort decreased. Difficult words became easier to pronounce. Next, I practiced my speech with my family. Unfortunately, my husband was at work during this period, and since he works as a truck driver, he was not lucky enough to listen to my speech. I tried to rehearse my speech in front of my children, imagining that my children were the audience I was supposed to speak to. However, my children are too young to understand this test. At first, they laughed at me, and then they asked me to be silent. It was fun. The next thing I did was record my speech on video. It was a little uncomfortable but very helpful. This allowed me to see where I needed to improve my delivery. For example, the way I used my hands and the tone of voice. All these methods helped me improve my pronunciation and memorize my speech, but the fear and uncertainty of whether I could speak in public in English did not leave me.

When the day arrived for my first public speech, I experienced a whirlwind of emotions. I was haunted by the fear of being stupid and the thought that I might make pronunciation mistakes. The thought of embarrassing myself or looking stupid because I had experience in public speaking as a lawyer drove me crazy. Doubts began to creep in: "Can I really do this?", "Can I overcome my fear and doubts when speaking in public?" These questions kept ringing in my head, but I knew I could not let fear hold me back.

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



Dragon Tea Cafe is a delightful Vietnamese restaurant located in Antelope. It offers a variety of options, including coffee,

desserts, and, of course, an impressive tea selection. Whether you're in the mood for a cozy dine-in experience or prefer to enjoy their delicious offerings at home, Dragon Tea Cafe has got you covered with multiple service options: delivery, takeout, and dine-in.

If you are fascinated by boba tea and banh mi (sandwiches), this is your place. You can adjust the sugar level of your drink, which is helpful for some people who prefer less sugar in their diet. Additionally, they offer dairy-free boba milk tea for those who are lactose intolerant. Some people want caffeine-free but like to drink tea, so they offer some caffeine-free milk tea, too.

We loved the jasmine milk tea, and the winter melon milk tea comes along with various selections of boba. They are so good with the choice of less sugar and less ice. Nandini and Anju bury Sam's body in their house garden, but this is seen by Anu. Later, when Vijay comes home, his family informs him of the incident, and he plans strategically to save his family from the police.

Meera the Inspector realizes that her son has gone missing, and with the initial investigation, she begins to suspect Vijay and his family. Learning from the movies and predicting that this would happen, Vijay plans a cover-up to protect his family. Vijay coaches and trains his family on how to stick to the plan and change their statements when they are questioned individually. Vijay practices the plan with his family to stick to the alibi no matter what happens. Meera arrests the family to beat the truth out of them. During the investigation, Meera learns from Sam's friend Alex about the video that Sam made of Anju. After the police thrash the family for a few days, Anu reveals that she saw Nandini and Anju burying Sam's dead body in their house garden.

The police dig up the house garden but only find the remains of a calf. Vijay walks to the crowd to let them know that the police had beat his family including his children. The police attempt to attack Vijay and his family but are stopped by the public.

I watched *Drishyam* several times. It is very thought-provoking and asks some difficult questions. Besides asking the audience very tough questions, *Drishyam* teaches us that family comes first and that the whole family needs to support each other, but there always should be a limit for protection of our families to not break law and commit any crime. Helping family members to hide the truth and lie is also a crime that leads individuals, families, and communities to com-

mit more crimes and creates chaos. What we learn from the movie is that we should support our family members during their hard times to the extent of not breaking any laws as there is rule of law and government systems to determine what is right/wrong or what happened intentionally or by accident. This film also looks closely at the need for family members to have each other's back no matter how powerful your enemy is. The film not only entertains you, but also makes you think about how to love, care for, and support your family members in their hard times.



couldn't understand the language and the task given to him.

Sometimes, teachers would use sign language to facilitate things. He could not make friends because he could not understand them. As a result, he was always seen alone in the library, cafeteria, and playground. Abaan used to come back crying; he wanted to go back home because he hated both school and language. My mother (Abaan's grandma) received many phone calls from

Abaan telling her that he has no friends and hates staying there!

My son's suffering continued not only with the language but with the new culture. One day he needed his classmate to pass him the green crayon, so he put his hand on her shoulder and pointed at the green crayon. Shortly after this incident, I received a phone call from Abaan's classroom teacher to the effect that she wanted to see me.

Immediately, I dressed and went to the school. Mrs. Shelton, the classroom teacher, asked me to teach my son how to keep his hands to

himself and not tap someone's shoulder when he asks for things! Well, Mrs. Shelton, you could have saved the day by teaching him how to say: "Excuse me"! We could have avoided all this hustle and bustle!

Abaan's struggle continued. His limited vocabulary was not helping him enough to express or convey what he wanted to say. Even when he tried to say something, he was called "weird" or was laughed at! This had a great impact on him emotionally, psychologically, and physically. He started having ulcers in his mouth, and urinated in his bed. He was not a happy, comfortable child who enjoyed life like any other kid of his age. My heart burned and broke for him as I watched the apple of my eye suffering at this young age!

There was nothing I could do. I know learning a language is not an easy task; it takes at least six months to speak the language and gain back

someone's confidence. The matter with Abaan might take longer because he hated everyone around him. Another reason is that when someone learns a language, he/she always uses his/her mother tongue to compare and contrast, but the case with Abaan was that his "limited" and "fractured" Arabic could not help him enough at the time he needed to make such comparison and contrast, and that poured more misery onto his problem!

The only happy time my little boy had was

when his ESL teacher took him out of his classroom to her room, taught him, played with him, and motivated him by using positive emoji stickers like "stars" and "good boy," and high five him.

On a snowy day, kids did not get to go outside during recess time. They stayed inside and had indoor activities, like playing with Legos, cards, stuffed toys, and others.

In Virginia, bathrooms are inside the classrooms. One day while the kids were having one of their indoor recesses, the teacher had them sit on the carpet and

everyone played with his/her favorite toy, when suddenly my silly bean stood up and hurriedly went to the bathroom. He moved fast, and accidentally stepped on one of his classmates' Legos and continued to the bathroom.

When he was out of the bathroom, he saw "Aero" standing beside Mrs. Shelton, pointing at Abaan, crying and saying, "He stepped on my Lego, Miss"!

Abaan looked very puzzled; he didn't know that he had stepped on Aero's Lego when he was rushing to the bathroom. Mrs. Shelton asked, "Abaan! Did you do this intentionally?" Abaan repeated after her: "In ...ten...ally "!! Abaan was taught by his ESL teacher to repeat new words without knowing the meaning of the word, so he said "intentionally," and then the poor boy said, "yes," with a smile. Well, Mrs. Shelton: Don't you think the word intentionally is too big for a fouryear-old boy who has just started to learn the language?

As a result, he was grounded the entire recess time to sit on "a grounded mat" alone not playing with anyone! When he returned home, he told me this incident with eyes filled with tears. Wiping his tears, he looked up and asked, "Mama! What is the meaning of intent....ally?" In simple Arabic I explained it to him and added, "From now on, when the teacher asks you for something you don't understand, just reply to her with, "Sorry! I

didn't get you."

The very next day, after I sent my little prince to school, I called my father, who is my problem solver at all times and in all situations, and I told him about my son's suffering. I told my dad everything. After an hour of listening, my father asked me to convey this message to Abaan: "A man who speaks a language is one but a man who speaks two languages is two."

I know that Abaan will never understand Grandpa's beautiful words. The whole time, I was

thinking how to convey it to him in his 4-year-old language.

Just as I was doing the house chores, I entered Abaan's bedroom to vacuum it and saw his Superman toy lying there on the floor. I immediately knew what to tell my sunshine when he came back from school.

At the dinner table, I told Abaan that Grandpa phoned today and asked me to tell you this: "A boy who speaks one language is just a boy, but a boy who speaks two languages is a Superman"!

Abaan suddenly looked at me smiling. Such a smile, I have not seen on his face for ages. My cute boy's white pearl teeth were showing. Leaving the dinner table, my bird started roaming around the

apartment saying, "I'm a Superman. Yes...Yes....I'm a Superman." These words changed my boy 180 degrees. These words were very motivating and refreshing. That night was the first night that Abaan's bed was not wet in months!

Soon after that, Abaan's ulcer started to diminish, and he was seen around everywhere, trying to socialize with his peers and ignoring their negative comments. Mrs. Shelton noticed the difference. Abaan was no longer that introverted boy who sat alone all the time, so she asked me

what happened. And what changed him?

Abaan's trouble with English continued, but with time my wizard was able to surmount it. His interaction with his peers helped him to acquire the language faster, and his stickers all over the kitchen appliances, bedroom furniture, and bathroom were an excellent tactic that helped him rack his brain to memorize new words. His punctual weekly visit to the public library was very effective; reading his favorite books was a challenging experience. All of these helped him to gain more

vocabulary and familiarized him with English sentence structure and its grammar. On top of that, Dr. Suess's collection of books played a significant role in improving his listening and pronunciation.

It was the end of the year already and Halloween was knocking at the door. I bought my hero a Superman costume. When he came back from school, I handed him the costume and a note. As soon as he saw what was in the package, he said: "Look! It's a Superman costume. Is it for me?" I nodded my head, "yes." The note says, "King Abaan, you rock this year. Today, you are a real Superman. Put on this costume and get out to collect your treats!"

Finally, Abaan's hard work has paid off.

Today my champion is 13 years old, and he speaks like a native. In fact, sometimes he corrects me, and sometimes he laughs at my mispronunciation. Abaan has climbed every step of that difficult ladder that is called the "English language" without missing a step until he was capable of reaching the last and the highest step of the ladder.

Indeed, his determination and perseverance proved that he was competent enough to carry out his tasks by himself and without the need of others. Abaan's tremendous efforts and a strong desire to be a Superman helped him achieve great success in the language.

As a mom, watching my kid's daily suffering taught me a great life lesson: "It does not matter how slowly you go so long as you do not stop, and if you get tired, learn to rest, not to quit!"




Book Review: Ghandi

Gandhi is one of the stories in the Burlington English intermediate-level platform, which is available to you if you take the class ESLLAB through the ESL Center at American River College. (See the note at the end of this article.)

The book *Gandhi* is a beautiful educational story in a simple and enjoyable style. The story is a biographical account of Mahatma Gandhi's early life, struggles, personal growth, and the beginnings of his fight against injustice. The story emphasizes Gandhi's early awareness of social and personal injustices, which paved the way for his later activism. This is evident in his confrontation with the caste system and his rebellion against it, which is confirmed by his saying when criticizing ideas that classify people: "This is the work of the untouchables, the lowest class of people in India." This highlights his early awareness of social-class division.

After a monotonous life in India, and because



of his academic excellence, he was given the opportunity to move to England, the country that was occupying India at the time. The period that Gandhi spent in England can be considered a period of cultural and intellectual awakening, but it was also a period of unity and struggle to preserve his values. This clash of civilizations that he faced constituted a kind of mental stimulation for Gandhi. This prompted him to begin asking questions about colonialism and the possibility of a life other than the one imposed by the occupier and entrenched in people's minds.

The narrative then turns to Gandhi's experiences in South Africa, which have been pivotal in his development. There he began to become aware of the necessity of confronting all forms of racism and injustice because of the discrimination he faced. For instance, he was thrown off the train and not allowed to ride in first class just because he was not white. This ignited his determination to fight injustice. He said, "But I will fight in any way I can.... I will explain my ideas, I will resist, but I will not become a victim of their prejudice." South Africa can be considered the dividing stage between the personality of the "shy Gandhi," who was unable to say a word in front of people, and the "revolutionary Gandhi," who was skilled at rhetoric and persuasion. South Africa is where he changed from a young man who aspired to improve his financial and professional situation into a leader committed to the concerns of his people, whether in India or abroad. Taken together, these elements show Gandhi's transformation from a young individual unsure of his abilities into an assertive figure committed to social change, laying the foundation for his later achievements in India. The story uses these early experiences to illustrate how personal challenges and adversity can shape a leader's character and principles.

The story then highlights Mahatma Gan-

dhi's evolution from a South African civil rights activist into a leader of the Indian independence movement. He believed in the necessity of adopting nonviolent resistance, and in this context, the narrative emphasizes the power of nonviolence, as Gandhi's ideas influenced major social and political change. His tireless activism, including the famous "Salt March" and his leadership during the "Quit India Movement," are hallmarks of his approach.

The final chapters of the story detail the culmination of Gandhi's struggle for Indian independence and his commitment to nonviolent resistance. Despite suffering imprisonment and personal loss, including the death of his wife, Gandhi persevered. His leadership during the Quit India Movement and negotiations with the British government eventually led to Indian independence. However, the partitioning of India caused great conflict and violence, which Gandhi protested by fasting to promote unity. The story culminates in Gandhi's assassination in 1948, which shocked the world; but his legacy lives on, inspiring global movements for civil rights and freedom.

The story also explores Gandhi's personal life, revealing his struggles and reconciliation with his wife, reflecting his broader philosophical journey towards nonviolence and compassion.

IR-5 Visa: Bring Your Parents to the U.S.

Disclaimer: This information is based on the author's experience and can be used for reference only because each case is different. It is not professional instruction.



I filed an IR-5 visa to bring my parents from Vietnam to the United States after I became a U.S. Citizen in 2022. After one month of receiving my Certificate of Naturalization, I started filing form I-130 Petition for Alien Relative online through https://my.uscis.gov/. I created an online account through this website to keep track of all my paperwork because I didn't file through mail. I think it's easier to file online because you won't lose your paperwork in case of mailing issues.

After filling out form I-130 for both parents, I needed to gather evidence and documentation from Vietnam, such as my parent's marriage certificate, their divorce certificate, birth certificates, passports, my birth certificate, my marriage certificate, and other evidence of our relationship. After that, I paid the fee for form I-130.

Around 11 months later, USCIS (U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services) sent me an email and mail about approval for my cases. They sent our cases to NVC (National Visa Cen-

ter) https://nvc.state.gov. This includes 12 steps from the beginning to finish the application.

I went to the IV website https://ceac.state.gov/IV/ to continue filling out the document for my parents. I needed the 2 important serial numbers to be able to log in to my parent's case which was sent in the email.

On this page, I paid the Visa fee and Affidavit of Support (AOS) fee. I added a Joint Sponsor (if needed) to this page without paying an extra fee. Two days after paying the fee, I received an email about starting my application. I went to the NVC website to see which documents I needed to submit. I gathered all the documents and submitted all immigrant visas to this IV website which took me 2 months. You could do it faster if you had all the paperwork in English. My parents' paperwork needed to be translated, so it took longer to complete. This paperwork includes DS-260, civil documents, sponsor, and joint sponsor documents.

After all the documents were submitted, it took me 3 weeks to receive an email from NVC for my parents' interview. The interview email is usually sent 3 weeks to a month before the

interview date. We had this whole time to go to have medical exams and get vaccination records ready.

On the interview date, my parents needed to bring all the documents that I submitted to the IV website. They came to the US Embassy an hour early before the interview time to be ready for it. The interviewer asked them a couple of questions that were related to me and their marriage. After the interview, they said my parents would receive their visa in a couple of weeks and kept their passports. Two weeks later, a courier

I waited at least 10 days before paying the Green Card fee for my parents on the USCIS website https://www.uscis.gov/forms/filing-fees/uscis-immigrant-fee. This website has all the information you need to pay the fee. I kept track of transaction numbers and added my email to make sure the process went smoothly. I used the receipt number that was sent to my email after paying the fee to check the status of my parents' Green Card https://egov.uscis.gov/.

Finally, I bought the flight ticket for them to come here. There are many videos and websites that help you fill out the application; however, you need to check the reliability of the resources before using them. It will help you save time and not delay the process of your documents.

After all this hard work, I'm looking forward to my parents finally joining me in California on March 9, 2024.

Parent to Parent Program at ARC





At first, I was super excited about the trip because I would have a chance to go overseas to so-called "Third World" countries. However, my voyage became a nightmare for me when I was stuck in the middle of the sea for over a week.

On the night of November 24, 2023, around 12:45 a.m., the fishing vessel *Ken*, which was green and white in color, about 100 feet in length, and 20 feet in width, grounded 45 nautical miles off the coast of Cuba in the Caribbean Sea. There was only the captain and I on the boat. We called out to the Florida branch of the United States Coast Guard (USCG) to try and get some help. They transferred us to the Cuban Coast Guard to get help because we were outside the jurisdiction of the USCG. We called many times to the Cuban Coast Guard branch but

couldn't get help from them because we had radio complications. Around 5 a.m., a small local boat came up close to us, and we were able to see if they could help in the meantime. At the same time, I was able to get in contact with John, who

was the agent for my boat, to see if he could help us with the situation. We were able to get a big local fishing boat, the *Captain Jimmy*, to come and try to pull us out. They tried three times but couldn't, so they left a little while later.

In the meantime, John was able to get in contact with the Cuban Coast Guard and have them send one of their ships. They arrived sometime later in the afternoon and were able to try to pull us out a couple times but to no avail. The tide was too low at that time, so they couldn't try to pull us out again until the next morning. Around 6 or 7 p.m., the Cuban Coast Guard had us go with them onto their ship to spend the night for safety reasons. There was only one member in the Cuban Coast Guard who spoke English to communicate with me.

While all of this was happening, John was able to get in contact with another large fishing vessel, the *Sensational 1*. The next morning, November 26, the *Sensational 1*, which was flying a Jamaican flag came and working together with the navy ship tried to pull our boat out about five more times, but it did not work. At this point, everyone there was starting to lose hope, but none of us wanted to give up yet.

The tide went down and then the boat rested leaning about 45 degrees onto the right side. Both boats that came to help us backed off and anchored for the night nearby. The captain of the *Ken*, five naval guards, and I stayed on the boat to rest. The next day, November 27, only the *Sensational 1* tied up to the stern of our boat and tried about three or four times to pull the *Ken* out but couldn't. The Coast Guard vessel couldn't help

with the rescue anymore because they had some mechanical problems. A little while later, all captains met up together on the *Ken* to talk together and to figure out a solution. The naval ship said that they could not continue to help pull our boat due to engine problems,

which they weren't able to disclose, but they could still stay there for security and to help in any other way, as they had guns with them. The *Sensational 1* said that they would try pulling again the next day.

That night, the *Ken's* captain, five of the naval ship's guards, and I stayed on the *Ken* again. On November 28, the *Sensational 1* tried pulling again at high tide a couple times but still could not pull the boat out. We decided to stop pulling and to just drop an extra anchor that the *Sensational 1* had and tied the *Ken* to it so that the waves wouldn't push the boat any deeper onto the reef. At that time, a small storm came through and brought 3- to 5-foothigh waves, which caused some delay in the rescue. We decided to wait for another boat and some more supplies to come before continuing the rescue.



During that time, we were short on supplies, water, and food. The local boat that came on the first day asked for a lot of food from the *Ken's* crew and stole many supplies, tools, and water from us. We couldn't resist for our safety; however, they did help us a bit with buying some of the supplies to pull the *Ken* off of the reef. We were lucky that our boat had Wi-Fi and a satellite phone so that we were able to communicate with people for help. We had to go fishing for some food while we were stuck in the middle of the sea for survival. We caught a lot of different types of fish that we didn't know and it helped us relax our nerves a little.

On the 8th day, two more boats came to help rescue our boat. It took many hours for the three boats together to pull the *Ken* out of the reef. They were using multiple ropes that were about three inches in diameter. We met many difficulties during the rescue like storms and disagreements between the captains. In the end, they were able to

pull the *Ken* out of the reef. Everyone was overjoyed and clapped their hands and celebrated our hard work. We all were so happy because we could return home safely. After that, it took three days for the *Sensational 1* to tow the *Ken* to the dock where we were originally headed before we needed to fix the damages which the reef caused.

I believe that I was lucky to be able to return home safely because the whole experience was terrifying. Being stuck in the middle of the sea, having low provisions, and facing rough weather made me feel like I was in a horror movie. I had watched many movies and heard many stories similar to this situation, which made me feel awkward. Now, after experiencing a shipwreck firsthand, I realize that anything can happen at any time. We need to be prepared and train ourselves to face any situation.

The Untold Story of Afghan Women: Mahnaz Peroz

In 2001, when the nascent democracy of Afghanistan started, a young woman named Mahnaz Peruz was a feminist with an important goal. She hoped to influence and create a positive change in the lives of many Afghan women. She lived with this goal since childhood, as she had witnessed many restrictions and problems that women faced for decades in the history of Afghanistan. Having the goal of becoming a social activist and human rights defender in her mind, she entered Herat University to study International Relations. In addition to pursuing her education, she started working with a team of like-minded people as the manger responsible for the journal of the Faculty of Law and Political Science. After graduating from Herat University in 2011, she started working with a group called the Women Activities and Social Services Organization first as the Deputy for Advocacy and then as Chairwoman of the shelters in west region of Afghanistan. At the same time, she was volunteering as the Family Protection Committee Secretary of the Herat Provincial Council. Following her career and life goals, she continued providing services to women and defended their rights by occupying the lecturer position at Jami Private University and Youth Affairs Manager of Herat province for a period of two years. As the first woman occupying the Youth Affairs Manager position, she faced many challenges that she overcame with hard work and dedication. Serving for three and a half years as the Youth Affairs Manager, she started working in Herat Press Department as the first woman in this department's 100-year history.

During her working life in Afghanistan, the biggest challenge that she faced that stood in the way of her bold activities was the gender and sexual view of women. She suffered the most harm from this area. Despite performing her duties and

responsibilities well, she still was targeted by men because of her gender, and she faced different problems because she refused to consent to men's abusive treatment and sexual discrimination. Moreover, threats to her safety from the Taliban and other opponents of the previous regime created additional challenges.

It was a complete disaster when Afghanistan fell into the hands of the Taliban. That was August 2021, and since then, the welfare centers in Afghanistan have decreased greatly and poverty has reached the door of families more

than ever because many offices and institutions have been closed. Thousands of individuals have become unemployed since the fall of Afghanistan, and many women who were breadwinners of the family were now imprisoned in their homes for the crime of being a woman. Following that, for more than two years, girls have been prevented from going to school and university, which has led to collective despair in the people, especially among the women of Afghanistan, because they see their future and dreams completely blown away. They feel there is no hope and they will not

be protected.

girls who have a passion to serve their fellow women, but they did not know the possibility or they were struggling with family restrictions.

To guarantee the progress of women in Afghanistan, she believes that everyone needs to work to eliminate the extremist and the nationalist government of the Taliban. When the Taliban overtook the government, it affected the entire work and personal life of Peruz and many other women like her. In fact, they either were imprisoned in their houses or were killed by different opportunist enemies. Due of the fear of being

killed or abducted, she left the country and started a new life in Germany. She didn't give up; she started to learn German and started to work as a volunteer with two different institutions which provide services to immigrant women in Berlin.

Living safely in Germany, she has been able to enjoy some hobbies, such as yoga, watching movies, and traveling, but she continues to work for women and girls by organizing and participating in protests for social services and to defend women and human rights. Furthermore, she has created her own

group of women activists in Germany to meet people in the international community who can advocate for girls and women in Afghanistan. She also believes that creating a standard educational system in Afghanistan can help women's self-awareness, self-confidence, and empowerment. That is the reason she always tries her best and continues to encourage girls and women to pursue their dreams of an education.

Throughout her career in Afghanistan, Peruz has always tried her best to support girls and young women. An example of that is the arrangement of various educational and cultural programs for girls. These efforts include encouraging girls to go to university by getting a discount on tuition fees in private universities and encouraging girls to use foreign scholarships. She also encourages them to participate in civic and social activities. Among her goals was to help young

- 3. Stick the peanut shells one by one around the






ballon, but leave the top open. (Avoid applying glue on the balloon).

Identity and Legacy: Exploring the Moorish American Sect

What does the word "Moorish" mean in general?

"Moorish" is a term used in various contexts to refer to the peoples and cultures that existed on the Iberian Peninsula (which today includes Spain and Portugal) during the Middle Ages, especially those with Islamic origins from North Africa. The word is derived from the word "Morocco" and historically referred to Muslims who lived in Al-Andalus, the Islamic lands of the Iberian Peninsula, from the 8th to the 15th centuries.

What is the peculiarity of the term in the American context?

In the American context, especially concerning the American "Moorish" community, the term "Moorish" refers to African Americans who embrace the cultural and religious identity promoted by the "Moorish" community. Followers of this movement consider themselves heirs to the ancient Muslim traditions and culture of North Africa and Andalusia (a region in southern Spain), emphasizing their Moroccan and Islamic origins as part of their identity.

What is the "Moorish" sect, its founder, and its teachings?

The Moorish sect, officially known as the "Moorish Science Temple of America," was founded in 1913. The founder was Noble Drew Ali, who was born Timothy Drew. Noble Drew Ali began founding the movement in Newark, New Jersey, to improve African Americans' social and spiritual conditions by strengthening cultural and religious identity.

Noble Drew Ali worked to educate Af-



rican Americans about their alleged origins in the Maghreb and North Africa and urged them to embrace Islam as a religion and way of life. He also encouraged them to adopt a new identity as "Moorish Americans," claiming that they had heritage and rights that needed to be reclaimed. His teachings and approach to combining religion and cultural identity are integral to the broader movement for African American empowerment during the twentieth century.

As the founder of the Moorish American community, Noble Drew Ali taught his followers that African Americans were not "Negroes" or "coloreds" but rather "Moorish Americans" with a rich heritage and history that they should re-

claim and be proud of. By adopting this identity, African Americans who follow the movement's teachings seek to redefine themselves and their history, asserting independence, dignity, and a

distinct cultural and religious identity.

The American Moorish community adopts Islam as a religion but with a unique interpretation and practice that distinguishes it from traditional Islam. It combines elements of Islam, Christianity, and other philosophies. The sect also adopts teachings that emphasize many moral

"Moorish Qur'an," it is considered the holy book of the sect's followers, containing the movement's, and a ment's teachings and principles, including the ethics, laws,

suit the movement's goals. Also known as the



and spiritual directives that Moorish **Americans** are supposed to follow. Although he uses the name "Qur'an," the text completely differs from the Holy *Qur'an* known in Islam. The book includes topics such as

values, such as self-reliance and personal dignity, and adds distinctive elements to them, such as its emphasis on belonging to the Moorish

nation, which is considered part of the identity of its followers. The movement also uses the "Circular Our'an of the Moorish American Scholar," a central religious text within the Moorish American sect presented by Noble Drew Ali, containing his own teachings and interpretations of Islam to

character, virtue, ethics, and personal responsibility, emphasizing living according to certain principles that promote dignity, self-reliance,

and awareness of cultural and religious identity. It aims to provide a spiritual and moral framework that helps improve African Americans' social and spiritual condition through reconnecting with their claimed heritage.

What is the "Moorish" relationship with the state of Morocco?

The American Moorish community's relationship with Morocco goes back to the cultural and historical claims made by the movement's founder, Noble Drew Ali. According to his teachings, African Americans, especially the Moors, are believed to originate from the Maghreb and have historical roots in the ancient Moroccan Empire. Noble Drew Ali claims that African Americans are "Moorish" by identity, citing Moroccan and Islamic origins as part of their lost identity that must be reclaimed. Therefore, the red flag of the Moroccan state with a green star is present in the sect's forums and gatherings, and one can also notice some types of traditional Moroccan clothing, such as the red fez (a fez is a round, red hat with no brim and a flat top) which is made in one of the oldest cities in Morocco, Fez.

This relationship, therefore, is not based on direct political or diplomatic ties between the sect and the modern Moroccan state but rather is based on cultural and historical claims aimed at strengthening the cultural and spiritual identity of the movement's followers. Some scholars believe that by adopting this Moorish identity, Noble Drew Ali and his followers sought to redirect African Americans toward a deeper understanding of their history and culture, away from the stereotypes and labels imposed on them during the period of slavery and beyond. This alleged relationship also forms part of the movement's endeavor to provide a cultural and spiritual framework that Noble Drew Ali believe would allow African Americans to reformulate their understanding of themselves and their place in the world, relying on the idea of connection to history and culture that transcends the modern geographical and historical borders of the United States and Africa.

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Explore California:The Sutter Buttes
