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
# Want to Learn More? Write by Hand!

# My English-Learning Journey By Sayed Edres Sadiqi

This is the story of my English-learning journey, or I can say more generally, my journey of learning a second language besides my native language, which is Dari. I can communicate in Dari, Pashto, English, Urdu, and Hindi now. Learning a new language might be easy for some people and for others may be so challenging. It always depends on the person's interest and motivation to learn a new thing. If a person is interested in learning a new thing and has motivation, that helps them. "Hard work always

pays off." I have experienced this in my life, and I deeply believe in it.

Seeing so many second language learners at ARC trying to learn English and at the same time taking classes towards their

majors reminded me of my struggle in learning English many years back. It caused my mind to go back to the many challenges I faced to be able to communicate in English. Since I personally went through the same journey as so many ARC students are going through now, I thought that it might be interesting for some English learners and even for some it might be inspiring if I shared my story of learning English.

So, in this article, initially I will talk about my educational history and will link it with learning a new language. Then I will discuss what happed, that I started learning English and

finally will share the strategy I used to learn English in my English-learning journey that might be helpful to you.

#### **My Educational History**

Many people might not even remember when they were in their first grade at school, but I remember it well. I remember it because a very huge thing happened that year that affected my life and education to this point. I was in first grade and six months passed from the time I

started school that the Taliban took over the country (Afghanistan) for the first time. My teacher, Marzia Jan, got banned from school and was no longer allowed to come and teach at school. I along with all my classmates was forced to wear turbans to come in the class. So many other bad changes in school and in our life happened that year, not all of which I can mention in this article.

Even though all these bad things happened in the first year of my educational journey, it never stopped me from working hard and doing well in all my classes. Starting from the 1st grade I was the second-to-top student of my class till I graduated from 12th grade, when I still was the second-to-top student of my class. I loved all the science subjects like math, chemistry, biology, physics, etc. and was so interested in learning new things every day in those subjects. However, from the start, I never liked language subjects, like English, Arabic, etc. I also didn't like history and geography either. I was always struggling with English, history and geography



and putting a lot more effort on these subjects because I was not interested in learning them. So, that is why learning these subjects was more difficult for me than the science subjects that I loved. I thought after graduation from school I will go to university and will do my bachelor's degree in civil engineering, but the life circumstances put me in a totally different path that I had ever thought about.

#### **My English-Learning Journeys**

Life does not always go as you planned. When I graduated from school, considering my family priority, I had to start working to help my family financially, so I got a job. It wasn't long before my job and my school back-ground

helped me to get a scholarship to go to India for 8 months and get some job-related training. That was the first time I felt the need of English language skills in my life and that was when

I got trapped



manual, so I could go home and read and learn it from my chapter. The trainer highlighted the topic and showed me the pages that I needed to study at home. I had a desktop computer and an English-Persian dictionary installed in it. I started reading the chapter by highlighting the English words I did not know the meaning of. I found 115 words in one page that I didn't know! It was embarrassing and at that moment I realized I had a very challenging mission that I needed to go through in order to keep up with my work. My mission was to learn English and try my best to not fall very behind from the training classes I was taking at that time and learning English at the same time. Hence, I sat

and thought for a few minutes on what to do. I developed a strategy that helped me learn English and attend my classes. The strategy I developed helped me a lot in that period of time and even now that strategy is helpful to me in improving my lanquage skills.

#### My English-Learning Strategy

The strategy I developed and used to learn English was pretty simple and easy. However, putting the strategy in practice is neither that simple and nor that easy for many new language learners. My strategy was to highlight new vocabulary words from my class readings and also from any source I was reading. Then, I looked to find the translation from English to Dari/Persian. After that, I learned the spelling and the meaning of the words and put them back into the context of reading to understand the reading. Finally, the most important part of

into learning English. To keep up with my job, I had no other option than to learn English because the training was an essential part of my job, and my future promotions depended on it. So, no matter what, I decided to learn English. I remember the first training class I attended, the lecturer talked for about one hour, but because I didn't know the language, I did not even get the topic he was talking about. When the lecture for each day was finished, I asked for help with my very broken English. I asked the trainer to help me find the topic of the day in my training

my strategy was to use the new words I learned every day in my daily communication. If some words were not used in my daily conversation, I tried to do some writing to use the new vocabulary words. I do accept that learning new vocabulary words and at the same time trying to use them would be challenging for some people or even some would argue that it is not possible at that level to use the new words accurately. But that was not important to me. I kept reminding myself about my mission of learning English. Even if I was not using proper grammar or vocabulary words, I had enough courage to use whatever I knew to communicate with my fellow classmates and trainers. During the initial days, my communication was full of errors and mistakes, but every time I made a mistake using improper language or grammar, I was corrected and that itself was a lesson and helped me a lot to learn English. I really learned English from the mistakes I made in my communication with people and gradually my English got better and better. Within 3 months' time, my English improved so much that I felt I needed to enroll myself in an English-speaking class where I could improve my English and learn academic English speaking. I enrolled in a 3-month English speaking class at Heritage Institute of Language in India. That was the first and the last English class I ever took in my life. Since then, learning English has been a personal journey for me. I still use the same strategy to improve my language skill. I capture new words, learn them, put them into reading context, use them in my daily communication and use the new things I learn in my writings.

The life lesson I learned from my English learning journey is this: if you want to learn a new language, first you need to be determined to learn, then you need to do lots of readings from different sources to improve vocabulary, and finally you need to put in practice what you

learned by communicating and using what you learned in your daily communication and writings. This will help you learn the language faster and better. Below is the formula I used to learn a new language.

Determination to learn language + hard work in improving vocabulary + courage to communicate what you learned + learning from mistakes = fluency in speaking a new language

# Al Can Play a Crucial Role in Learning



Enter the world of machine learning, where the future is shaped by AI intelligence. To realize what the time ahead looks like, it's helpful to review our history. So I would like to give a brief history of computers and artificial intelligence. Just two decades ago, punch cards were the primary means of computer storage, and mobile phones in the 90s had tiny green or white displays. Yet, over time, computers rapidly evolved, becoming essential tools in our daily lives. Throughout history, scientists have attempted to build machines that have the same intelligence as humans, known as artificial

intelligence (AI) which is processed by machines, particularly computer systems. Some language professionals fear that if students use AI, they may not appreciate human values anymore due to fear of reflection, and a lack of human relationships. Students can be more independent and may not need any more humans for learning a language because they have AI tools like ChatGPT for self-tutoring and learning. It is essential to recognize the supportive role of AI in education, by working alongside human instructors and others. Al algorithms can efficiently analyze assignments or other performances, providing valuable feedback to both students and instructors. For example, when I need to edit my assignments for grammatical and spelling errors, I use Grammarly tools because Grammarly offers real-time suggestions for grammatical and spelling errors, this process can build

better and clearer papers. Meanwhile, it can speed up professors' performance too for check-ups and grading. Moreover, Al can offer significant benefits outside of the classroom, such as in research, and other fields. For example, researchers can accelerate knowledge advancement and uncover deeper understanding across a variety of disciplines and areas. In addition, people can use artificial intelligence technologies to simplify tasks and increase productivity. For example, a friend of mine is a professional and has developed a robot program to manage multiple tasks for large companies, and

because of that receives multiple salaries. Rather than being concerned about AI, the Education Department should work on improving learning and working environments with AI metaphors and becoming more creative. It is possible to find ways to manage AI risks. At least schools would be able to create some guidelines for using and providing training and awareness programs. To keep the

value of humans, and build good relations among the students, instructors, and AI, instructors should work and assist alongside AI in learning a language.

There is concern that relying on artificial intelligence for language learners would lead to cheating, and students would not spend enough time on learning material compared to students who do not use Al. How intelligent and curious a student is affects how they use Al, they usually like to use it to learn a language, not to cheat. Al tools can be really helpful for students who are learning English as a second language. It helps expand knowledge using new tech, is available everywhere, and gives quick responses and results. When I don't know words, it's tough to find a paper dictionary and even harder to quickly find word meanings in one, so to save time and get good results I can use Google Translate, which can be accessed anywhere

and anytime from my phone or other electronic devices. If AI is banned for students, it could cause friction between students and teachers because students deserve the freedom to learn, so instead schools should find ways to control and prevent cheating, as well as explain to them the pros and cons of using AI and encourage them to use it effectively.

Professors and language scholars may not support AI technology since they have studied and researched for many years to learn a language, but now they will substitute it with AI, which may cause their retirement. Professors and language scholars can benefit from AI in many ways, such as updating

teaching methods to make learning more engaging for students since the new generation is more likely to adapt to the new learning model. It is therefore necessary for instructors to incorporate fresh and useful information into their lectures by using some new teaching

techniques along with AI. Asher College AI-enabled educational resources, such as virtual labs and simulations, helped me visualize complex concepts and develop theoretical scenarios while studying the A+ program. These new methods were very interesting to me and other students because it was an updated method with scenarios, and practice felt like a person helping me to learn and memorize my lessons, while still imagining those scenarios in my head. As we live in a modern world, people do not want to adopt the old ways of teaching and learning because we can take advantage of the new technology and use it to our advantage. Humans will enjoy many benefits and facilities if AI is allowed to grow, especially for learners. If we adapt to new technology (AI) our country will keep its position among the most advanced countries; otherwise, other countries like China are powered by new tech, and

may overtake us. For example, among other things, Squirrel AI is revolutionizing how Chinese learn, and more than a million students registered to learn Chinese. So, professors and language scholars can update their knowledge and adjust to the new environment of education in supporting AI.

As technology advances while we can gain an advantage in our lives, professors and language scholars can gain an advantage from Al in a variety of ways, allowing them to deliver better lectures faster and more efficiently. Schools must provide material and instruction on how to use Al, as well as manage how to prevent cheating among students. The way students and other learners use Al depends

on whether they use it in useful ways for positive purposes or misuse it for negative purposes. They should understand the benefit of AI platforms because it can provide a good outcome for people who are looking to learn. Artificial intelligence can simplify people's daily lives, save them time and money, and help them perform their duties. If we do not use AI, other countries like China will use it to improve

and change people's lives, which will make them a powerful and important nation. On the other hand, Americans will lose out to China in modern technology if they restrict AI for users, especially for language learners. As a result, we should support AI tools like ChatGPT, Google Translate, Grammarly, and more to improve language learning for ESL students and keep our position among the most advanced countries.

Here are the ingredients and Instructions for preparing shornakhod.

- **Ingredients:**
- Chickpeas
- Onion
- Cloves of garlic

- Salt (to taste)
- A pinch of baking soda
- Grape vinegar
- Apple cider vinegar
- Dried mint
- Red chili powder

#### Instructions:

- 1. Prepare the chickpeas:
- Rinse the chickpeas thoroughly under cold water.
- Soak the chickpeas overnight in a large bowl of water. If short on time, use the quick soak method: boil the chickpeas for 2 minutes, then let them sit, covered, for 1 hour.
- 2. Cook the chickpeas:
- Drain and rinse the soaked chickpeas.
- Add chickpeas, chopped onion, and some salt in a large pot. Cover with fresh water and bring to a boil in a steam pot. Reduce the heat and simmer for about 1 to 1.5 hours, or until the chickpeas are well cooked.
- Then add a pinch of baking soda and cook the chickpeas for another 5 minutes in a steam pot. This helps achieve a smooth, well-cooked texture.
- Take the cooked chickpeas in a large bowl.
- 3. Prepare Vinegar:

Prepare the vinegar in a separate bowl with drained mint, chili, and salt to use as individual tastes differently during serving.

When I started my education at ARC, because I came from Afghanistan the system was totally new for me. I faced similar problems multiple times. It has been two years since I started at ARC. I got familiar with lots of resources that are available at ARC to help students. Luckily, there is a department at ARC called Calworks and EOP&S. There are so many programs to help the parent-students there. A parent-student can enroll in that department and get help from their program. Some of the good benefits they can get

from enrolling with the Calworks and EOP&S departments are getting a counseling appointment in the same day or next day and getting a priority registration date to pick classes earlier than other students. Eligible students can get the money they spent on their books from the county via the Calworks department, and finally they can also enroll in the parent-to-parent mentorship program of Calworks to be linked with a mentor who speaks their native language and can give assistance with any questions during their educational journey at ARC. I have gotten a great deal of help from the Calworks department so far and I am sure every student who needs assistance will be helped there.

and seeing the castle. Then, I started to connect things that I had seen in my favorite movies, and now I could see it in this place. I feel like it's still magical.


#### Who's your favorite Disney character?

To me, it is a meaningful movie because you can see the humanity when Thai residents tried to help his family to escape. On the other hand, the killers were dangerous and showed no mercy even




to a kid. If anyone wants to watch an action movie, *No Escape* is an excellent choice.

# RECIPE: KOMBUCHA



Green Tea Kombucha

#### **Prepare:**

- A big live SCOBY(stands for Symbiotic Culture of Bacteria and Yeast)
- 2 medium 3-gallon glass jars or 1 large 5-gallon glass jar
- The jar must be washed, cleaned, and dried completely.
- Kitchen napkin (paper)
   Big dark fabric (to cover the whole jar)

2 gallons of boiled water with a good amount of real tea leaves. (I used around 4 cups of tea leaves because I love strong tea. Tea bags are acceptable but not as good as the real leaves. You can put the leaves in a paper bag to get it out easier after boiling).

#### In the pot:

- After the tea is boiled, let it stand for at least 10 minutes, and then filter out the tea leaves.
- Add 4 cups sugar and stir to dissolve.
- Add the correct amount of filtered water (around 2 or more gallons in this case). Note: Test the tea temperature. It can't be too hot.
- Use boiled water to disinfect any utensils that you used during the process.





Hibiscus Kombucha

#### In the jar:

- Pour the mixture into the jar after it has cooled down.
- Add the SCOBY on top.
- Leave the napkin on top of the jar, and then close the lid loosely.
- Cover the jar with dark fabric. Leave the jar(s) in a dark and cool place.
- Check back after 3-4 weeks. When you don't taste any sweet, the fementing is done. Otherwise, you will need to wait another week to check it again.
- \* You can store the kombucha drink in the fridge or mix with juice. It gives you more <u>benefits</u> than you know.
- \* You can try different kinds of tea to have different flavors.
- \* If you try hibiscus kombucha, your SCOBY will be dyed pink or any color depending on the tea you use.

My uncle-in-law is a kungfu master who always seeks for something organic and good for the body. He taught me how to make kombucha. At first, I thought it was vinegar, so I refused to drink or try it. Later on, I found its benefit, which is beyond what I thought. I have started growing the kombucha myself.



as preschool, so some kids may learn typing before learning to write by hand.

But is this a good idea? Research is showing that writing by hand has surprising benefits, not only for children but also for adults.

# Handwriting is more work, and that's a good thing!

Studies show that tracing out ABCs, instead of typing them, leads to <u>better recognition</u> and understanding of letters. Writing by hand also strengthens kids' <u>memory</u> of words, laying the foundations of literacy and learning. In adults, taking notes by hand during a lecture, instead of typing, can lead to <u>better understanding</u> of material.

"There are actually some very important things going on during the embodied experience of writing by hand," says Ramesh Balasubramaniam, a neuroscientist at the University of California, Merced. "It has important cognitive benefits." Recent research suggests that handwriting's power comes from how it forces different brain systems to work together.

#### Your brain on handwriting

Both handwriting and typing involve moving our hands and fingers to create words on a page. But handwriting requires a lot more coordination between the motor and visual systems. This seems to engage the brain in deeper ways that support learning.

"Your fingers have to, individually, do something different to produce a recognizable letter," says Sophia Vinci-Booher, an educational neuroscientist at Vanderbilt University. "Your visual system must continuously process every letter as it's formed. With each stroke, your brain compares the new script with mental models of the letters and words, making adjustments to fingers in real time to create the letters' shapes," says Vinci-Booher.

#### That's not true for typing.

To type the word "dog" your fingers don't have to trace out the form of the letters — they just make three simple movements. In comparison, it takes a lot more brainpower to write than type.

"There seems to be something fundamental about engaging your body to produce these shapes," says Robert Wiley, a cognitive psychologist at the University of North Carolina, Greensboro. "It lets you make associations between your body and what you're seeing and hearing," he says, and this may help the mind access ideas in more ways.

This is especially important for learning in kids, but it may help adults, too. Wiley and others worry that if we give up handwriting for typing, then it may seriously change how we all learn and think.

#### What might be lost

The clearest consequence of screens and keyboards replacing pen and paper might be on kids' ability to learn the building blocks of literacy — letters.

"Letter recognition in early childhood is actually one of the best predictors of later reading and math attainment," says Vinci-Booher. Her work suggests that learning to write letters by hand is crucial for learning to read them.

Research suggests kids learn to recognize letters better when seeing different handwritten examples, compared with uniform typed examples. This helps develop areas of the brain used during reading in older children and adults, Vinci-Booher found.

Stopping handwriting instruction in schools could mean that those skills don't get developed as well, which could impair kids' ability to learn down the road. "If young children are not receiving any handwriting training, which is very good brain stimulation, then their brains simply won't reach their full potential," says van der Meer. "It's scary to think of the potential consequences."

Many states are trying to avoid these risks by requiring cursive instruction. This year, California started requiring elementary school students to learn cursive, and several other states are trying to do the same. (So far, evidence suggests that it's the writing by hand that matters, not whether it's print or cursive.)

#### Slowing down and processing information

For adults, one of the main benefits of writing by hand is that it simply forces us to slow down. Because writing by hand is slower, it forces you to process the information. "You make the information your own," she says, which helps it stick in the brain.

What happens if we have computers write more for us? It's possible that this might free up our minds to do other kinds of hard thinking, he says. Or we might be sacrificing a fundamental process that's

necessary for the kinds of learning experiences that enable us to learn and think at our full potential.

Balasubramaniam stresses, however, that we don't have to stop using digital tools to enjoy the power of handwriting. So far, research suggests that writing with a stylus on a screen activates the same brain pathways as writing on paper. It's the movement that counts, he says, not its final form.

These cosmic lights illuminate the Northern atmosphere.





#### <u>Show</u> Design

Indian Idol is designed in a way to discover the hidden musical talent across India. Indian Idol follows 7 steps. The first step is called Auditions. Auditions take place in several different cities across India and online to allow more participation. Contestants are selected based on their singing talent and performance in front

of judges. The second step is the Theatre round. The selected contestants from the audition round perform solo or in groups. Considering their performance, judges decide to eliminate or pass them to the next round. The third step is "top contestants". In this step, 12-15 contestants are chosen to perform live in from of judges each week and compete with each other. The 4th step is "Gala Rounds/Live Performances." In this step, contestants perform live each week in front of judges and live audiences. Judges provide feedback, but public votes via SMS or online platforms decide who stays and who gets eliminated. Step 5 is "Mentorship" where contestants are mentored by experienced musicians or vocal trainers to enhance their skills and prepare them for better performances. Step 6 is "the grand finale." In this step, a few remaining contestants compete for the Indian Idol title. The winner is decided based on the combination of public votes and judges' scores. The final step is "Prizes." The winner receives a cash prize, a contract with a music label and so many other rewards like cars, a recording deal, etc.

#### **Favorite Winners**



My favorite Indian Idol title winners are the best of all the best 14 trophy winners so far. However, I must accept that in the last fourteen seasons, there were lots of contestants that didn't get into the final round, but they were my favorite singers. Since there are so many, I can't talk about each one of them here. My favorite Indian Idol contestant who has won the trophy is Pawandeep Rajan, season 12 in 2020-2021.
